The **WORLD CUP** is fast approaching . . . May 8-15 in Barooga, New South Wales. Barnaby, Chet, and Eric will travel along with Doug Dufresne (International Referee), Cheslye Larson, and myself. I'll be working on some international relations with the BAA, as well as helping "the boys" with their tactics ("Try and CATCH this one!", etc. . .).

The USBA NATIONALS are scheduled for the weekend of June 18/20 in the Bethlehem, Pa. area. Housing will be at the Moravian Academy (site of last year's International Team Test), which should provide an excellent low-key affordable setting for a great boomerang weekend. Peter Ruhf is site manager and tournament director. Our goal is to have the Nationals continuing to be held in August in the future. The diversion to June this year is strictly due to the International Team Challenge already scheduled for August and the inavailability of housing later in September. You will receive a separate mailing regarding all the details on the Nationals in due course. Beginning next year, we will initiate a rotational system to move the Nationals around the country at regular intervals. The event will rotate West, South, Midwest, East, and back to the West. This will help to develop a better distribution of interest across the country and make for a more "fair" selection of sites. Many throwers cannot afford to travel coast to coast for a major event every year. This way, we'll be bringing the Nationals "to an area near you!" At least every 4 years.

The INTERNATIONAL TEAM CUP will be held August 18-30 in France, Germany, and Switzerland, with two six-man teams from the USA competing. It's a busy season of boomeranging coming up! In addition, look for an influx of overseas visitors; including Roger Perry of Australia, and Matthias Giesenschlag of West Germany during August and September. These boomerang enthusiasts will be traveling the country, visiting friends, and throwing in tournaments with us. Welcome to them and others planning on visiting. Drop us a line and let us know if others are coming to visit!



1988 Competition Rules

The rules committee (at press time) is finalizing rules changes for 1988. The revisions will be compiled and printed as a supplement to the 1987 Rules Book, which served as a base for these revisions. You may obtain a copy of the revisions from:

by sending a SASE with your request. Complete copies of the rules plus revisions are available from the USBA Store.

The major considerations for this year include the **possible** introduction of clean catches into the **Consecutive Catch** rounds, and the inclusion of **Doubling, Juggling** and **Endurance** into the Overall ratings for the year. SAFE and ACCURATE methods of measurement are the main topics which still must be solved before Distance enters as a standard event.

MTR 100 will probably become the primary rated MTA event, with MTR unlimited still contested, and MTA 50 placed "on a shelf". Throwers still have the option to launch from the Bullseye, if they wish,

to challenge existing "MTA 50" standards, but would of course run a risk of "Blowing out".

The major change for throwers will be the improvement of the rating system. The leading proposal includes BEST scores entered into the ratina system for throwers who only participate in one tournament. Either AVERAGE or PLACE points would enter the system with the second tournament, and all three factors would be included for three or more tournaments. In addition, each event will be ranked individually before totalled with other events to determine "Overall Champion". In other words, the person with the best cumulative score in Accuracy (total of place, average, and best scores) would receive 11 points for first in that event. The person with the second highest cumulative points would receive 9 points, etc. With 8 events contested for Overall (Accuracy, Consecutive Catch, MTA 100, Australian Round, Fast Catch, Doubling, Jugalina, and Endurance], the best possible score for overall would be 88 points. It is our belief that this will give a much more accurate representation of what actually occurred in tournaments, as well as providing incentive for throwers to continue participating in ongoing tournaments.

### WORLD BOOMERANG THROWING CUP 1988

Greetings from the members of the BAA Inc. The World Cup will be staged at Barooga, New South Wales with the first Test on Sunday, May 8, second Test on Wednesday, May 11th and the third Test on saturday, May 14th, 1988.

This major change in venue [from Alice Springs] has come about due to the failure in securing a major private sponsor for the Central Australian venue. I tried every possible avenue to finalize the venue, but failed. Barooga is a different story with a major private sponsor being secured as the first step and we are building on that lead. The Barooga Sports Club is the major private sponsor for the "Australian Bicentennial World Boomerang Throwing CUP 1988".

All previous details included in Bulletins 1,2,3&4 will still apply to this new venue;




### BOOMERANGS IN MUSIC, LITERATURE, and TU


Many thank to David Boehm of the Cleveland Boome-rang School for identifying the rock group "SHOES" on their new album cover called "Boomerang". Can any of the readers tell us why they would name the album this way?

The January, 1988 issue of "BOYS' LIFE" has the same series of cartoons that I read 30 years ago. I was amused to read that Pee Wee Harris had spent 5 weeks making a boomerang in honor of the 1988 Australian Jamboree. He tossed it into a strong downwind and it sailed away. After waiting for hours, the boomerang returned for a one handed catch and a first place ribbon. He set a world record in distance and MTA on the same throw.

Lorin Hawes has issued a third edition of his famous book " ALL ABOUT BOOMERANGS". This time, the book is co-authored by John Mauro, past USBA President. The book contains much of the same information and illustra-



tions as the second edition that was released in the 1970s, except for a section that John Mauro contributed on contemporary events, new records, and his famous "Three Sigma"



design. This is worth purchasing, especially if you are a newcomer to the sport and/or never got a copy of the second edition. The glossy colored cover features an assortment of collectables by many the best boomerang craftsmen in the world today. Where can you get this book? Lorin Hawes sells it in his shop in Queensland, Australia for \$8. You get a dollar off for every boomerang you buy at the same time. Lorin says that many customers try to take advantage of him by purchasing eight boomerangs and getting the book for free. If Queensland is

not on your itinerary in the near future, the only retail source for it in the USA that I know of is the B'Man. He retails the book at \$9.95. If you order just the book, the price with postage and handling is \$11.00. If you send \$15.00, B'Man will include a xerox copy of John Mauro's publication: "An Introduction to Boomerangs". The B'Man also has other publications such as Stephen Silady's "The Complete Australian Boomerang Book" which retails for \$13.00 plus \$2.00 postage and handling. This is a big book with a boomerang on the cover. He has a few copies of Herb Smith's book for sale. These are now out of print. Collectors would be wise to get one while they still can. The B'Man also has a few select Herb Smith wooden boomerangs available at an attractive price that complement the book. Has anyone seen the movie: "The Bosses' Wife"? ' There is a scene where someone takes a boomerang on a business trip.


"Leonard, Part DI" is a super spy spoof movie where the bad guy throws a boomerang knife. It returns and stabs him in the chest.




Ted Bailey has been going to gun shows and looking for the people who

These things are out there. All you have to do is look for them. Collectable boomerang prices have sky rocketed in the last decade. The time to start a collection is now while great boomerangs are still affordable. They are a great hedge against inflation considering the weak dollar and the fickle stock market.

The demand for Australian Aboriginal Arts and Crafts has increased immensely in the past several years. Yet, no one seems to be taking advantage of . this demand with a retail sales outlet. out of his shop in the Sydney, Australia suburb of Kings Cross. He writes the following on the availability of antique boomerangs in Australia:

"There are no OLD booms of the return variety available, other than those in private collections. The only old booms are of the NON-RETURN type, which come in from time to time. These are truly collector's items. They range in price from \$200 - \$2,000 each. I don't have a brochure on these as they keep changing through sales.

The town aborigines make them using modern machinery much cheaper: \$40 upwards to \$100. The timber is the same: usually *Mulga, Cidgee, Briga-law*, etc.

I am trying to get Joe Timbery jr. to make some natural returners. I have to supply the timbers so this should take about two months before theu are ready. The best available in Australia are those supplied to my shop made out of Black Wattle (acacia). There is a lot of Mulga coming on the market as returners, but definitely not so. The makers just don't know enough and *Mulga* is too heavy for returners. These are beautifully decorated and magnificent timbers for decorative purposes, but will not come back. They sell at \$70 - \$120 each. Not a good buy for throwers."

### ROMANTIC 'RANG

Dr. John Tkach writes the following on his early boomeranging experiences: "My first boomerang was a plywood model in 1965 that broke the first time I threw it. Mu first boomerang that worked was a plastic Wham-O that I bought in about May 1965. It was smaller than the later model designed by Lorin Hawes with a sharper angle between the wings. It made perfect figure eights effortlessly. I have one old one left. It broke in half, and I don't have the heart to throw it out. Lots of fond memories. Boomerang throwing made for lots of nice and inexpensive dates. Girls tolerated it. Please do not publish this in Many Happy Returns. I do not want my wife to know. "

Editor's note.... I recently picked up one of these old Wham-Os in a garage sale and was amused by the throwing instructions:

"It returns! Hold like a scythe with flat side down. Throw sidearm and overhand. EXPERI-MENT!!! "

### **ON YOLKER'S HEELS**

Craig Kittredge of Greenville, South Carolina writes the following on his experiences with the DISTANCE challenge: Before reading the article on long distance in the Winter 1987 issue of MHR. I had done some experimenting myself. All I could do was about 85 meters with my distance 'rangs that look like a Challenger II in reverse. I prefer leading arm throwing. After reading the article, it dawned on me to use more weights. The results: 30+ meters more with an average of about 115 meters total. No great accomplishment compared to 145 meters but it did give me a lot of satisfaction. I've come to the conclusion that distance throwing is like making money: You've always got to have more, Watch out, Behrens!

### **Boomerang Game**

A Wild West Game we play here in Gunnison, Colorado, is "Steps". Very simply, the low score wins. You get a test throw, that you can keep as a score and you can throw one out. So potentially there are 7 throws. Simply count the steps to pick up your boomerang. Long legged people have an advantage as long strides are allowed, even bounding strides. If your boomerang lands at your feet but doesn't touch you, it's one step. The only way to get a zero is if it hits you. You must stay in the spot you threw from and your hands must stay by your sides. You can lean, raise your elbows, or fall into the boomerang to get a hit but your feet must stay put. It's a great game, for sure. Pretty stupid at times too, because I've actually seen people lean with their heads to achieve the O! The record low score is mine at 4, but there are a couple of people here that routinely beat me.

I did an 18.04 second fast catch with my split fast catch boom that was previously used for 3 rounds of 18.2 seconds. With another 'rang I had flights of 2.04 to 2.10 seconds, but it was too difficult to connect five throws in sequence. All three of us did super catch. I did it on my second try."

"... My first **super catch**was done with Rob Greer. I
caught the five Doug DuFresne fast ones; and then

I caught the MTA under the leg. Then Rob Greer did Super Catch with the same Bailey-MTA and a different DuFresne-fast catch. And then I did Super Catch again; only all the fast catches were made under the leg and the MTA was caught with a diving one-hander. The next weekend we all went down to Doug's and did it. again. Last Saturday, Lukyn Phipps, Rob Greer and I were all clocking Fast Catch fivers at 20 seconds and under. Lukyn got 20.1 & Rob Greer got 20.4. Not world records, but still great fun."

### Ben's Correspondence

trom Jackie Byham at Cabram, Dictoria

"I am still enjoying a good cough and battling with the to-bacco habit. Between the smoke and the accumulated dust on the lungs from the 3/4 million boomerangs I've made, the old (66 years old) lungs are not what they are used to be. However, I still lead the field three times a week on the golf links.

There is still demand for my boomerangs but I don't make many now, and no plywood models. I concentrate on a few carved mulga killers or good natural wood returners. With the massive influx of tourists into Australia, the demand is insatiable. My nephew, Peter, Byham, who took over my business, turns out more than 1,000 a week, recently 7,000 in 12 days. I can't keep up. He secured the sole rights from the government for the 1988 Bicentennial logo boomerang at a cost of \$2,000 and has orders flooding in from far and wide.

I recently returned from a 22,000 kilometer and three month trek visiting old places from way back, plus a few new spots. I visited the lanami desert, Hooker's Creek, Broome, Darwin, and Borraloola. There is

not much left in Australia where I haven't been. I camped out every night; it was a modern day walkabout. I stopped in about 6 Aboriginal settlements, the furthest out being Kintore, 520 kilometers west of Alice Springs, almost on the West Australia border. There were some 500 aborigines there, all Pintubi, the last group contacted some twenty years ago and now for seven years living in a settlement.

Permits to visit Aboriginal settlements are necessary now, to go on what I consider to be mu own land. We have reverse Apartheid here now, in my opinion. And the permits are not readily available. I hit it off well with the Pintubi, who speak the western desert dialect with which I am familiar. Boomerangs are almost a memory now among the Aborigines, who used them extensively for hunting when I was younger. They do use them to settle squabbles or in ceremonials, but the old days of hunting with them as I saw 45 years ago, seem to be finished. The same with the spears. Not many of the young generation know how to use them. Rifles have taken over. I threw returners in most camps and mostly the desert people had never seen them and were fascinated."

from Jae Becker af San Francisco . . . .

"I just returned from vacation in Egypt where, in the antiquities museum in Cairo, I was astounded to find myself in the presence of King Tut's boomerangs! I had known vaguely of Egyptian 'rangs from books, but I was still thunder-struck to actually see them. When I tell my friends that I've actually seen King Tut's boomerangs, they just snicker pityingly."

from Roger Perry of Western Australia

"In my part of the world, we have about 20 to 30 regular throwers out of a population of 2,000. At the last state title throw, throwers from Norseman took 13 out of a possible 18 trophies; there were 30 competitors of which 5 were Aborigines. Competitors came up from Perth, including Sam Blight. The comp was held at an Aboriginal training center.

We have about five Aborigines throwing in Norseman, all kids. One girl is looking real good. We had a consecutive two handed catching contest, and she took first spot with 38 straight on a really windy day.

Because it's in the desert, boomerang throwing conditions aren't so good here. We only get about two days a week when it's calm enough to throw, depending on the season. November and December is the best time for us.

Recently I gave demonstrations for more than 1,500 school kids in Kalgoorie and taught the general public to throw. The real surprise was an Aboriginal girl of about 13 who could really wing them. After masterina different short range boomerangs, I handed her a 50 meter plus hook to have a go and she put it out a long way and took the catch twice in a row. It turned out that her whole family were deft throwers, with the father coming originally from the Worburton ranges. Her grandfather had been an expert with the hunting stick, being deadly accurate at 30 to 40 meters. He was also used by the police as a tracker. kalgoorie has really taken to boomerangs with more than half of my stock being sold there. I am looking forward to getting a club started there.

The one thing I've noticed about boomerangs is they're a great barrier dropper. We have "bikies", miners, doctors, and people from all walks of life throwing in Norseman. I know of no other sport that could bring all these different folk together."

### **NEWS FROM BRAZIL**

Carlos Martini Filho of the Bumeranque Clube do Brasil writes to inform us that they are expending considerable effort to promote the sport of boomerang throwing in the Sao Paulo region of Brazil. 

### Making 'Rang Tricks Pay

Jacques Sotty, a 25 year old from Paris, has figured out a way to make real money from boomerang throwing. He performs exclusively for his own benefit. Unlike his American peers who happily throw when requested, by television crews and still photographers; and who read nothing more than a moment of fame when their image is viewed, Sotty hires his own photographers to record his boomerang "stunts"--his word. Because he pays up front, he owns the product, which he copyrights and peddles. This strategy yielded him \$5,000 on a single photograph last year.

Sotty's "stunts"; sold to ad agencies, photo distributors, and TV networks; have included:

+ A night toss at the Berlin Wall over East Berlin, around a guard tower, and thence back to West Berlin for the catch. When the communist guards in the tower say the sparkler being lit on the boomerang for the night photograph, they thought an attack was being readied and raised their guns. For a second throw, however, they leveled cameras.. Sotty named his boomerang "Peace" and explained rather elliptically: " I

used a war tool to serve a peace mission; I did the throw to make the wall disappear."

- + A toss around a church steeple while hanging suspended from a hovering helicopter.
- + A series of throws with Australian Aborigines in the Aussie Outback.
- + A New Year's Eve heave in front of the Eiffel Tower in Paris with the throw in 1984 and the catch in 1985.
- + Another New Year's throw in Paris two years later. but this time with a champagne bottle mounted on his head for the boomerana, launched in 1986 to smash off in 1987. "Tens of thousands of bottles of champagne were opened in France at that moment," says Sotty, "but mine was the only one opened by a boomerang." How'd he do it exactly? Sotty says he scored the neck of the hottle with a diamond to weaken it. then shook the bottle vigorously to agitate the gases. When the boomerang struck on the return, there was a veritable explosion of foam. "It was a really dangerous stunt", says Sotty. "The bottle might have exploded in my face." The photo, in color, earned him \$5,000 from a worldwide photo agency and a champagne company which used it in an advertisement.

Sotty says: "I like to do things with the wind, speed, and danger." Some of his other

imaginative sport promotions: successfully racing the English Channel ferry across the channel in a storm while on a windsurfing board ( Sottu was eventually arrested by French marine police on a technicality], wind surfing 600 miles down the Ganges River in India while dodaina floating corpses ("It smelled horribly but the photographs sold well", he says), ice surfing in Leningrad, sand surfing in the Sahara Desert, jumping off a cliff with a parafoil kite strapped to his back: a particularly dangerous enterprise.

His next "stunt"? Sotty plans a throw around the world - literally. He intends to visit the North Pole and wing a boomerang, with wrist watch strapped to it [for advertisement purposes, of course], around the pole in eight seconds.

Sotty is a shrewd businessman who travels fast. On a visit to the United States last uear, he rented a luxuru American car, equipped the teenage girl he brought along with him with a gold wedding band, and tapped a large message on the rear window of the vehicle that read: "Just Married". Then the two of them blasted off on their high speed travels. As Sotty guessed, they were stopped for speeding by police several times. Each time they were let aff.


