



FOR EACH OF THE 8 RATED U.S.B.A. EVENTS:

BEST SCORE: (1 tournament result required to qualify) - Throwers' BEST score in an event.

MEDIAN SCORE: (3 tournament results req'd to qualify) - If odd # scores, the MIDDLE score in the event. If even # scores, the AVERAGE of the two MIDDLE scores.

PLACING AVERAGE: (2 tournament scores req'd to qualify) - The SUM of all Placing Points earned in the event, divided by the NUMBER OF SCORES obtained in the event.

TOTAL POINTS: The SUM of all points earned in the 3 categories, with thrower earning highest number of points receiving 20 pts., 2nd highest - 19 pts., etc.... Ties split points.

OVERALL RANKING: The SUM of TOTAL POINTS for all 8 rated events.

Mark Weary is the latest newcomer to the Super Catch Hall of Fame. Using his Romblad Composite MTA and Weary "Ice Runner" tri-blader, Mark was able to complete 7 F/C catches under his MTA, despite two drops. If Mark had completed a perfect round, this would have been a new World Record with 9 catches.

Three World Records were set at the first Arizona tournament. held in Phoenix, on October 16. First, Michael Girvin started the sequence by setting a World Record in Doubling (new USBA rules) with 17 catches. Then, Will Gix, with a score of 91, broke the long standing World Record score of 90 points in Australian Round, previously set by Brother Brian Thomas nearly 10 years ago. Will's World Record was short lived though. Only a few minutes later, tournament host Mark Weary scored an incredible 92 points to take first place in the event and the current World Record mark. The November 1993 issue of "Games" magazines featured a high/low quiz which provided the reader with statements about different trivial events. One of the statements was about the MTA boomerang. The quiz said "a boomerang has flown 86 seconds before being caught by the thrower". The answer section in the back of the magazine correctly mentioned that the statement was low. It listed **Dennis Joyce**'s competition throw and catch of nearly 3 minutes in 1988 as the current record in that event.

The 28 October issue of the Santa Paula/Filmore Star-Free *Press* carried an article, written by Michael Goldowitz, about local artist and boomerang manufacturer:Alan Scott Craig. Most of the readers already are aware of Alan's work through the movie: The Baghdad Cafe. Alan was the boomerang throwing drifter who played a major role in the popular German film. 

demonstrate in closed quarters. Gregg writes to notify MHR readers that there is now a new improved and larger version of the Tantrum (bottom right) for outdoor throwing. This tri-blader is also very easy to throw. It has a hole in the center for catching it on your finger. Another new outdoor boomerang is a lightweight two blader (left), called the "Ticket Junior" which is made out of Celtex material. All three of these boomerangs are lightweight and recommended for retail sales or for introducing new throwers to the sport. The mini-Tantrum retails for about \$2. The outdoor Tantrum and Celtex Ticket Junior retail at about \$5 each. Wholesale prices (50%) are also available to interested parties. 



The Russian Boomerang Association was formed in July 1992 after a newspaper article was published in Moscow about the proposed 1993 World Cup, which was scheduled to be held in Canada. Vladinir, who currently serves as club President, has made contact with clubs from the USA and Europe. Because the club is both new and small, the primary focus is on increasing the membership and promoting boomerang throwing throughout the states of the former USSR. There is a strong focus on bringing children/teenagers into the sport.

The members are involved in experimentation with new shapes (such as those depicted on page 25 of MHR #55). The most enthusiastic designer in the club is Vice-President Arkany Nemoy. The beautiful art work on some of the boomerangs is a result of the club promoting an interest in local artist groups, such as The Artist's Union of the Russian Federation and The International Federation of Artists from UNESCO. The boomerangs are made as part of an exhibition that includes both the artist's boomerang and canvas paintings. The new club is enthusiastic about

developing the competitive aspects of the sport. Assistance is solicited from the various world clubs to help the Russian club develop rules as well as anything else associated with competition throwing. The Russians are hopefull that they will host an invitational competition in the future after they are more seasoned throwers. 
As time allows, I will produce and market additional documents that focus on single historical or technical subjects in much the same way as technical papers are made available through various professional societies.

The 14th Annual Free Thrower's Fling

The 14th Annual Free Thrower's Fling in Delaware, Ohio came off splendidly on August 7 and 8. Thirty-four veteran throwers and 4 novice tossed in the sunshine. The presence of international stars like Sweden's Jonas "Thermal-Out" Romblad, USBA co-founder and living legend Rusty Harding, and World Champion Team Coach Barnaby Ruhe made it an especially magical weekend. Flynny and Barnaby road-tripped it in and out for the Saturday tourney, while Rusty Harding came up from Tennessee and amazed all with his presents and presence. His booms still possess that Harding mystique and they fly like dream sequences.

Columbus TV Channel 4 sent up Steve Saunders to do a Steve's Sportsworld Segment. His segments feature terrific special effects, with strobe action, stopaction, and killer soundtracks to boot. He captured Gary Broadbent's soliloguy of madness wherein he describes boomerang throwing as the number one sport in the world..."bobbing, weaving, shaking, baking, stopping on a dime, leaving nine cents behind, low to the ground, hard to bring down, bodacious, vivacious"...heck no one can get it all!! Cool action sequences of Chet and Gary hot dogging and going, "Yeow" make ya wanna go out and throw some right now! Of course, the main highlight was John Gorski's INCREDIBLE 17 minute flight on Sunday that hovered out and back and descended on the field for the catch. It was phenomenal. Jonas was there to see the feat with one of his MTA creations. We were absolutely freaking out and everyone immediately packed their booms and left the field with nary another

boom tossed after the religious experience. It just didn't seem right to toss any more that day. In tourney action, I played poor host by winning the overall title, but outside of a 19 in trick catch and a 19 in Fast Catch (both brought about by Chicago Bob who's superb throwing pushed me to it), I left the best throwing of the day to others. Stephane Marguerite came in from Montreal to rip a 74 in some very tricky light and variable Aussie Round winds. Delaware's Jason Krouse came up to me after three throws in MTA and said, "Chet, ya gotta help me. I need a score bad." Wanting to be a nice guy, and feeling pretty secure with a 36 on the board, I loaned him a Jonas that I could never get to fly right! "Here, try this." (Hey, what are friends for?) He pops it up for a 45 second flight that just hung there! Served me right. Ben Owen post-throw controlled his Accuracy Boom in for a 38.

Afterwards, we retired to the Tall Pines Restaurant and wolfed on some chow and passed out awards and listened to Rusty tell stories of the days before tri-bladers and easy scores!

On Sunday, we had a Free Throw which approximated a Beach Blanket movie. With tunes cranking from the van. Alan Winterrowd and anyone who wanted to tossed some disc, and we played games. If we didn't think the right team won the game, we played again. It was a fun, relaxing day where everyone could simply do what they wanted. Ben Owen's team was humbly named "Hot butter on toast" and consisted of every babe on the field including Carmen, Steph, Tara, plus some short, wild-haired stud whom we all hated at the time, but let his team take rethrows for the slightest interference, because, as Alan put it, "They just looked so good trying." Hope to see you there next year!

Nationals and US Open in the Great Pacific Northwest

Thirty-seven throwers ascended to the Pacific Northwest and Seattle for the 1993 US Open and National Championships. The setting was an incredible Soccer complex near Redmond, with 16 fields side by side by side. With hot air balloons hovering nearly every evening and radio controlled gliders soaring in the adjacent field, it was flight heaven. The winds were gracious and allowed some superb scoring throughout the weekend, with just enough slice and dice thrown in to make it interesting.

Chet Snouffer got in the zen groove early and never left, taking five-firsts (Trick Catch and Doubling, 12; Accuracy, 42; Aussie Round, 78; Endurance 48) and a second (MTA 36.59) and never lower than 6th to rack up 80 points and the Open title for the second year running. Steve Kavanaugh carried out the Barnaby Ruhe consistency strategy beautifully, with 2nd in Aussie (72 points), 3rd in Doubling (10), and 4th in Juggling (6) to go along with a handfull of 5th-7th finishes for second overall at the Open. Third went to Moleman with 2nd in Count-up (11) and Juggling (9), fourth Overall to Mike Dickson of Canton, OH, and 5th to John Koehler with 2nds in Fast Catch (19.6) and Juggling (9). Rounding out the top twelve who advanced to the National Championship on Monday were: 6th: Gary Broadbent, 7th: Doug DuFresne, 8th: Gregg Snouffer, 9th: Casey Larrance, 10th: Mark Weary, 11th: Byron Seward, and 12th: John Gorski.

Other first place event winners at the Open were Casey Larrance in Juggling with 17, Betsy Miale-Gix in Fast Catch with a ripping 19.14 seconds, and Barnaby Ruhe with 39.37 seconds in MTA. At the Nationals, the scoring was much tighter, with Chet and Mark Weary two-stepping around the lead early, then Mark grabbing it and looking to say, "Adios", before Chet rallied and took it back for keeps...but not by much! Four throwers tied for first in Trick Catch with 11. Stevie K., John Koehler, Mark and Chet just edged Mike Dickson, Doug Du-Fresne, Gregg Snouffer, Byron Seward and John Gorski at 10, but with all the ties, the point spread was 4.75 in favor of the 4 after one event.

Chet went into a total zone and scored 4 bulls and an 8 to tie the US Record in Accuracy with 48, while Gary Broadbent (39), John Gorski (38) and Gregg Snouffer (37, tie with Mark Weary) made it a Buckeye State sweep in the event.

Fast Catch went to Weary who smoothly stroked five around in 20.89 seconds. Gorski took second with 21.59 and Gregg was 3rd with 22 flat.

In Australian Round, Moleman drilled a 79 to edge Moleman with 78. Mike Dickson and Chet sat on 68, while Koehler scored 66. Great throwing all around with several 20 point bullseyes tossed in the variable winds. In MTA, Moleman popped a

34.75 second flight. Casey tossed

booms out of the park in warm-up as if he had some inside connection with Jonas, but then failed to score...we think he ran out of sticks! Mark Weary surged to score a 33.45 for second place and nearly ring the death knell on Chet's title hopes until "the Jet" averted disaster on his final throw for a 31.33 for 3rd. In Doubling, Koehler and Snouffer made it to 12 and then got to 13 and 15 respectively ahead of Broadbent, Casey and DuFresne

all at 11. In Juggling, the wind was up and

people were drifting downwind at a rapid pace. Mike Dickson scrambled for an impressive 19 catches to finish 3rd. Gregg Snouffer gut-



ted out 27 for 2nd, and Gary Broadbent stood and delivered in a slight and short-lived window for 35 catches and first place. By Endurance, Gregg was now awake and won it with 54 catches in a wind that was steady but pushing pretty hard. The strong finish vaulted him to 3rd place overall. Chet racked up $5\overline{3}$ to clinch second place and his 8th National Championship; the seventh in a row. DuFresne was 3rd with 51, moving him up to 4th overall. While Mark Weary had trouble in the tricky winds and snagged 42 for 8th place, he'd already done his homework and had built a substantial lead so that he secured second place overall.

World Records Fall in Phoenix

It was an exceptional southern Arizona weekend of October 15/ 16 when Mark Weary's first-ever Phoenix tournament was held. It was a weekend of rainfall in the desert, with cloudy skies in marked contrast to the sunny 85 degree heat that characterized the rest of the week. But it was more than just rain that fell on a small field attended by only 13 veteran throwers, yet observed by nearly as many local Mexican youths. It was a weekend for world records to fall.

The weather, which at first appearance seemed dismal, turned out to be the great aiding factor, as the cool overcast provided for steady 3-5 mph winds, in contrast to the fickle warm winds which are the norm. It was the last chance of the season to increase ratings for those who were thinking of Japan '94, and the throwers who made the journey were richly rewarded as the conditions yielded several best scores of the season for the ratings.

The order of events also contributed to setting two of the three world records for the day.

Leading off with trick catch and doubling, it was Michael Gel Girvin who asserted his dominance in this aspect of the sport by racking up 14 in Trick Catch and a world record 17 in Doubling (under the new rules established in 1992). He was challenged only by Chicago Bob in Trick Catch with 13, while Gregg Snouffer and Mark Weary dropped a foot catch and ended up with 11. In doubling, it was Steve Kavanaugh who joined Chi-Town and Gregg with 11 catches in second.

When Endurance came up, so did the winds, as the third event was won by Gregg, with 57, closely followed by Steve at 55 and Gel at 53. Kim Galeazzi finished fourth with 42. Fast Catch followed in the trickiest winds of the day, as just 6/100 of a second divided the top three finishers. It was Chicago Bob on top with 26.28, with 26.31 for the Wearymeister and 26.34 for Gel in third.

The winds were still up, but fairly constant when Gregg won Accuracy with 42, throwing an old Chet Aussie Secret that flopped out of the air for 2 bullseyes. Kim Galeazzi was second with 38 and Weary followed at 36.

By the time MTA was finished, so were the winds. But it was phenolic that won the day as Gel pumped a towering 33.81 with his own Icharus model, followed by Galeazzi's 31.38 with an MTA of his own design. It was a flapped Bailey thrown by Betsy Miale Gix that took third at 26.7 seconds. Many excellent throws left the 100 meter circle during the round.

By now the winds had settled in from the north at a steady 3 mph but Gel's 106 juggles was not enough to catch "Wildman Weary's" 232,using a pair of Chet Pterodactyls. When asked later how he felt about going for the master's own record of 502, Mark replied, "I don't think my legs would have held up that long." Interestingly, number 233 was a flat out drop that was in the hands, so one wonders, how long could he have gone?

But with darkness coming, the group had to hustle to get in Aussie round and as it turns out, it may have been GOOD LUCK that forced Mark's drop. The winds now out of the NE at 4, the stage was set for extraordinary scores.

Stevie K, with what would normally be an outstanding 70 points, ended up in 5th. Michael Girvin finished 4th with 79, throwing a Gel Sunshine that truly went 60 meters. Chi-town threw a 40 meter Sunshine (1/2 meter off of 50...OK, so Bob' weak) but managed 2 bulls, 2-8's and a 7 for 83 points...and third place! The round of the day was the 4th when Mark Weary and Will Gix took the field. Both threw phenolic Sunshine's going 50 meters.

Will's first throw netted an 8 for 18 points, followed by Mark's only 40 meter throw of the round, a sadly under thrown 5 point accuracy catch for 13 total. Will repeated the 18 on the second throw while Mark made the mental adjustments and popped a 50 meter bull. It was Will's turn to flub on the third throw, landing a 5 accuracy catch, while Mark stayed hot, hitting a 19.

By now the potential for records was fading away. To beat Betsy's 1991 world record 89, her husband could give up only one more point, while Mark had 2 to burn and still hit 90. Later accounts showed that neither was aware of this fact, which was perhaps just as well, as both threw perfect 20's on the fourth throw. When Will caught his final throw in the bull, the circle judge, Girworld record!" But by the time the spotters and spectators realized the feat, Mark had already let fly and calmly reigned in his own clutch bullseye to shatter Will's still shimmering new record with a 92!

In a stunning display that Reverend Jim summed up from Saint Louis as, "Well, they got the window", the most highly revered event and oldest world record had fallen twice, on two consecutive throws.

As the light quickly faded away, there was the sudden realization that 3 world records had fallen in one day...a new world record for number of records to fall on the same day. Then, as Kim Galeazzi pointed out, that made four world records in one day...a new world record...that was five. Bob interrupted this train of thought to observe that it was the most Mexicans on the field to ever witness the setting of so many world records, so there were six records all in one day. By the end of the next day and the team events, the team called, "I wish we had Stevie K." made up of Stephanie, Bob, Gregg, and Glen Boris, had dominated the competition, setting a new world record in Team Hackey in the process, running the total world records for the weekend to seven...a new record for number of records in a weekend, pushing the official total to eight. the moral? Be there next year!
