onships itself for both the proposed bylaw amendments and the officers and directors.

One of the primary concerns over the the last couple of years has been the diminishing membership numbers. I am pleased to report that we have made progress in increasing membership over the last few months. In order to further our long-term growth prospects, I believe our primary emphasis must be to appeal to kids and young adults. We also need to make boomerangs which work readily accessible to them at a reasonable cost. In general, we must create an atmosphere across the in which boomerang throwing is an accepted sporting activity that people will stick with.

Some of you are already working with scouting organizations, community recreation organizations, and park departments in your own communities providing not only an introduction to the sport but a structure through which people can continue to participate. One of the ideas that the membership committee adopted was my proposal to put together a curriculum for submission to school districts for incorporation of a boomerang unit in existing craft, physical education, or historical programs targeting grades 5-9. This program would incorporate an educational component with the history and development of boomerangs as a tool, recreational pastime and sport, as well as provide for instruction in basic boomerang games, safety, and throwing. Hopefully, this will be one of the projects worked on by the Board you elect for next year. Once we put together such a program it will be available through the USBA PO Box.

It is the responsibility of all of us to sell it to our neighborhood schools. It was suggested to me in recent contacts with the Edmonds School District Athletic Director that, instead of going to the School Board itself, it would be more useful to attempt to make contacts with the P.E. or History teachers and principles of individual schools to get the initial entry. He will be assisting Will and I, for example, in creating a workshop unit for the local alternative school which has students both of grammer school and middle school age. It is our intention to incorporate all of the above features into that workshop to the extent that we will be allowed time to do so. If the project is successful, you will be hearing about it later!

While we need to nuture all aspects of our interests we must not forget that it is the participatory, usually competitive events which will inspire the kids to continue throwing and give them reason to advance their skills. I am sure all of you have experience with teenagers, young adults, and not so young adults who have come out, seen you throwing, tried themselves, and then lost interest after a few outings. Like it or not, the key to increasing membership in most recreational activities has been the development of competitive games that give people the incentive to increase their skills and add additional equipment.

I encourage all of you to put into effect some of the events and activities that you read about in Issue 58 of MHR. In addition, the USBA has adopted a set of event rules to assist you in holding beginner or "Super Novice" competitions which are specially designed for keeping the interest and participation of new throwers. Such a fun tournament can be held at nominal expense for the director and can completed in half a day.

In the alternative, commit to being at your field on a specific day and time weekly, or every other week, or even once a month so that those in your community who are interested will have a schedule they can follow to find others to throw boomerangs with. As with any other sport the consistent opportunity to get together with others and have fun playing the game, trying new equipment, and developing skills is necessary for long term involvement in the sport.

All of you reading this are probably thinking, well that is nice, but it sounds like work to me. You are right, it is work. These things must be done by each one of you and by those you bring to boomerang throwing in your communities if we are to prosper.

If you do not know who the other throwers are in your area, you can obtain a printout of the current USBA membership by sending a request for it to the PO Box. Please include a SASE and check in the amount of \$2.00 to cover the cost of printing and mailing.

## How I Make Left Turn Boomerangs

The first challenge in making boomerangs is finding suitable plywood. The standard lumber. yard variety is' just too heavy and has too many void. It takes just as much time to make a boomerana g out of bad wood ma with good wood, but unless the wood is of fairly high quality, you just won't get many throws before it breaks. Look for ads in this issue or you may acquire a list of sources for good plywood from the USBA. See the inside of the last page of this issue. If you just can't wait for a mail order to arrive or you want to start with a small quantity, you can try hobby stores which specisiize in RC airplanes. Ask for aircraft grade plywood. Secondary possible sources are cabinet makers, and doll house shops. A board with a little bow or bend is fine, but avoid significantly bent pieces. This can have a devastating effect on boomerang flight. If available I use 10 ply 5 mm, or 4 mm. If the measurements are in inches, ask for 3/16, 5/32, or 1/8 inch. 1/8 inch works very well for mini sizes. Just use a photocopier to photo reduce a boomerang or pattern down to 75% size. I have not enjoyed using 1/4 inch. You just have to take too much wood off for the air foils, and you have to throw these heavier boomerangs harder.


The next challenge is to find the tools. I have a Dremel scroll saw. You can use a coping Saw or a saber saw. I have only used a saber saw a few times. I find I can not get the precision with it that I get with the scroll saw. Saber saws give rough edges on the blank. Before sawing, check the wood to Bee which way it naturally bows or bends. Take advantage of this by ensuring that you carve the airfoils on the surface which bows up. This will ensure that you have the

wood naturally adding the dihedral most boomerangs need. To facilitate sawing, I simply trace one of my patterns or an existing boomerang onto the wood. The boomerang should be cut with the grain going straight up and down or straight across. See Diagram 1. This will provide identical tuning ability for both arms. If the boomerang has the grain parallel to one arm and perpendicular to the other, bend or twist tuning will be very difficult. (This is not true for MTAs where it may be beneficial to have one arm more tunable.) Once the blank is cut, I use a variable speed drill motor with sanding disks to "carve" the air foils. I use two different disks; a stiff one with course sand paper for the trailing edges, and a foam padded one with medium sand paper for the leading edges and the elbow. I use a piece of medium sand paper wrapped around a pencil for the inside of the elbow. You can do all of this carving with hand files, rasps, belt sanders, or drum sanders. I have carved several boomerangs with hand files while sitting around camp on vacation. When using belt or drum sanders most makers put the blank upside down and work without seeing how much material is being removed. With a drum sander it is possible to place the blank under the drum but I have used drums and find I am happier with the drill and the sanding disks. Some people find that it is difficult to keep the sanding disk from jumping or skipping. I developed a technique of steadying the drill on the front of my body. You may want to match the height of your body to the height of your work bench to accommodate this.

To carve the boomerang, I lay the blank right on the edge of my work bench and steady the drill on the side of my body. I then move the sanding disks back and forth across the blank until I have removed as much material as I intend. With this technique you can see the surface on which you are working, so you can do this very evenly and quite gradually. You may want to

clamp the blank down, but I just hold it steady with my free hand. This is easiest on the trailing edge of the trailing arm, so I start there. I like to do the trailing edges first. I can do a better job of blending the leading and trailing edges if the trailing edges are there first. After I make the initial passes as described with the blank on the bench, I pick up the blank and use the disk with the medium grit sand paper to round the leading edges further. Using a slow rotational speed keeps me from removing too much material. Having made it as smooth as the power tools allow, I use a medium 3M Flexible Sanding Pad to complete rounding off the leading edges, the tips, and the elbow. These pads are a little expensive but they last for about 12 boomerangs and really make this step a breeze. I always round off these angles, but I do not round off the A/B (see figure) transition on many of my models. More on that below.

Getting started - I suggest that once you have the wood and the tools, you select a boomerang that works well for you and trace it onto the board. Try to carve an airfoil similar to the original. Verify that your copy has about the same dihedral (bend in the wings) and then take the original and your copy out to the field. If the copy does not behave like the original see if you can determine why. It may be a difference in the airfoils or it may be a difference in the dihedral or the angle of attack. On the next one, try radical differences in the airfoils (see below). I am not suggesting or condoning commercial copying of other's designs, but to make boomerangs for your own use, you will learn more quickly if you start with a design with which you are familiar and one that you can compare to a working boomerang. Ted Bailey suggests that you write the name of the originator of the design on your copy. It won't be long before you are totally bored with copying, and you will begin the adventure of experimentation with original designs.

# Column

...because enquiring minds want to throw. by Chet Snouffer

Dear USBA, Explain why dihedral has the influences it has. I know what they are, but I want to know "why"?

As you may recall, last issue we left Norm hanging. Well, a quick look into the archives found the answer, perhaps, to Norm's query. See if you can follow along.


The following article was written by Gerhard Bertling in the German newsletter, "Bumerang Welt No. II/1988. It was translated by Buzz Woodruff of the British Boomerang Society in BBS Newsletter # 2/88 and subsequently reprinted in "The Leading Edge" Issue #46.

More often than not, you just can't get away without a bit of bending; especially MTA boomerangs. Bending the wings (called adding dihedral, anhedral, or twisting wash-in or washout) is easy to get the hang of. It changes the lift, but also the wind resistance and drag of the changed arm.

Adding dihedral and anhedral makes a level or 2-dimensional body into a 3-dimensional body.

So what happens?

If you lay a strongly bent boomerang on a flat table, the arms will make contact, with the elbow and wingtips up in the air. If you press the elbow, the wingtips will go up, and vice-versa. So what position will the boomerang assume in the air, or to phrase it differently, around which axis will it rotate?



An example: If the body pictured above were rotating about the dotted line (left figure) then it would shift so as to stand up to the point where both ends were at the same height (right figure). In such a position, the body will have it's greatest momentum; it rotates about it's *preferred axis*.

A boomerang does the same thing. It assumes a position in which the wingtips and the elbow are at the same height. Expressed simply, if you turn your boomerang upside down on the table, with the flat side facing up, you will see the flight position in a hover. The table surface becomes the sky; the axis of rotation goes vertically through the table.


In figures 1-3 the flight position is depicted for the three possible bend-ins (the axis of rotation goes straight through the paper).

Picture #1: Dihedral on the leading arm indirectly causes the trailing arm's angle of attack to be *negative* (Washout).

Picture #2: Conversely, dihedral on the trailing arm causes positive angle of attack (washin) on the leading arm.

Picture #3: Dihedral on both arms causes a combination of the two: positive angle on the lead arm, negative on the trailing arm.

Therefore, in all three the lift on the lead arm is enhanced, relative to the trailing arm. Sitting flat or "laydown" is aided. (Continued on next page)





To add to this, there is further effect in flight: when the bent arm is ahead of the center of gravity (like the leading arm in figure 4), the raised wingtip is pointing in the flight direction. The air passes more underneath and creates additional lift. When the bent arm is behind the center of gravity (like the lead arm in figure 5), the raised wingtip is pointing backwards. The air comes more onto the upper surface of the arm with the result of less lift, or even negative lift.

Thus, in a manner of speaking, the bent arm has a variable angle of attack during flight, which is positive when ahead of the center of

gravity, creating the hover even earlier.

In the final stages of flight-during the hover-the picture is different again. The trailing arm almost cuts the air with the tip ahead. Simmilar to a ski, it's better to twist this tip up so it doesn't get forced down. As is well known, dihedral on the trailing arm lengthens hover.





# Saint Louis **Gateway Classic** May 29, 1994

The Gateway Classic was preceded and upstaged by the wedding of Chicago Bob Leifeld to Angela on Saturday. 'Rangers and family members came from miles around to celebrate the wedding and the sunshine and the fun in Forest Park.

Tournament day saw sunny skies and winds gusting from 10-20 mph all day long. The Australian-American celebration held in conjunction with the tourney brought large and appreciative crowds all day. A Didgerido player, Australian bands, jugglers, kitefliers and boom chuckers all added to the color and festivities surrounding the event.

Twenty-eight throwers and nearly a dozen novice (five alone with the mysterious surname of

"Broadbent") performed miniwind sprints all day as they tossed and ran after their sailing

**Chet Snouffer** won the day with firsts in Trick Catch (13), Endurance (45) and Doubling (new world record 21 catches. surpassing Michael "Gel" Girvin's 17 set last year). Gary **Broadbent** was second with firsts in Aussie Round (65) and Fast catch (27.6 seconds). Mark Weary was third, Chicago Bob 4th, and **Gregg Snouffer** 5th.

Saint Louis' Andy Bourey won Accuracy for the second year running with 35 in incredibly tough winds. Fort Wayne's Sean Marquardt won MTA with a 35 second toss during one of only a few lulls in the late afternoon winds. Sean was throwing a classic Bailey MTA, spurning the Jonas contingency and their high tech black carbon wizardry. It was kind of a paxolin day anyway unless you were fortunate to get a lull and even that doesn't help if you don't remember how to throw, as Chet

demonstrated by sidearming his Jonas to it's death with a spiral up and down, crashing into a boom bag and shattering along a prior stress crack.

Other scores and performances of note included Joey Fitzgerald's 4th place in Aussie Round. Tim Price of Michigan tossed a 28 second MTA for 2nd place.

Rounding out the top ten were

- minute MTA fame.

## Oakland, CA 4-16-94

Mark Weary, of Phoenix, AZ, took four firsts on his way to victory in Oakland this year. Weary tallied firsts in Accuracy (41 points), MTA (27.83 seconds), Doubling (9 catches) and Juggling (21 catches) to wrap up the overall. Host Michael "Gel" Girvin was second, posting top score in Endurance with 29 catches. He added seconds in Aussie and Juggling with a bevu of thirds to beat out Steve Kavanaugh of Seattle for second place. Kavanaugh's seconds in Trick catch and Accuracy were backed by thirds in Juggling and Doubling. Fourth overall went to Eric Fields who won Trick catch with 11 catches. Eric was third in Doubling with 9 catches. Swiss dude Kim Galeazzi, now residing in California, placed 5th overall while Joe Miller won Fast Catch in 25.82 seconds on his way to 6th place overall. Thirteen throwers had fun tossing 'rangs in Oakland in April.

# Olympia, WA May 28/29, 1994

Kelly Andretti hosted this tourney in brutal conditions in the Pacific Northwest. "Thirty to forty mile an hour winds, rain all day, and structural damage to buildings," claimed Michael Girvin. "It was horrible (weather)", added Kelly. "However, we all had fun."

The best indication of how difficult the conditions were is a quick glance at winning scores. Fast Catch: 46 seconds. Endurance: 30. (Both by Gel). In MTA only four people were able to make a catch, with Gel sneaking in a 30 second flight. Second place went to Casey with 11 seconds, followed by two 7 second throws!

Other events appeared more normal. In what has become alomost cliche, **Stevie K.** won Australian Round with 57 points. **Will Gix** won Accuracy with 29. You can count on the Northwest for some colorful personalities and this year was no different. **Spunge** and **Rusty Post** (his real name) took 8th and 9th overall.

# Silver Jubilee Albury Boomerang Championships, Albury Australia, May 7, 1994

Wow, talk about your legendary tournaments. They don't come any richer in history than the 25th annual Albury Championships in Australia. The Janetzki's, Jeff Lewry, Bob Burwell, Bunny Read, the Maxwells, Rob Croll, Bruce Carter...

This year the BAA celebtrates

it's 25th Anniversary. On May 6th, **Arthur Janetzki** turned 90 and on the 7th he scored 13 points for 16th in Accuracy at the Championships.

**Bruce Carter** edged Aussie's crème de la crème, Rob Croll by 2 points for the overall. Carter did it without winning an event, having learned a thing or two from Barnaby Ruhe. His 72 in Aussie was good for 2nd. Croll won Trick catch, and other winners included Adam Carroll in Fast Catch in 23.65 seconds, **Dennis** "The Master" Maxwell in Accuracy with 45 of 50 points. Morris Maxwell won Australian Round with 73 points. Native Australian Andrew Travis floated one for 41.91 seconds to win MTA 100.

# 1994 Australian National Championships March 19/20 in Sydney

Robbie Croll has won more tournaments in the past ten years than you and I dream about. In Sydney, he reaffirmed that he's not yet finished with his incredible string of national and international victories by winning the Australian Nationals once again. No small feat in that he not only had to best his countrymen but also defending Aussie champion, Mathieu Weber of Geneva. Switzerland! Weber, one of the top throwers in the world, won Endurance (50) and Fast Catch (New Australian record 18.51 seconds), his specialties, but **Croll** was able to counter with first in Accuracy (34) and seconds in Endurance and MTA, and never finished lower than 4th in an event.

**Croll** finished with 171 points in the Australian scoring system.

Weber tallied 164 for second. Third went to New Zealand's Earl Tutty with 163 points. Tutty set an Aussie record 15 catches in Trick Catch. Fourth went to Adam Carroll with a first place finish in Australian round with 76 points. Ian Sproul came in 5th with a first in MTA at 35.95 seconds.

Twenty-two throwers including venerable tossers **Bob Burwell**, **Brother Brian Thomas**, **Kevin Moran**, and **Ken Arthur**.

# Swainsboro, Georgia April 30, 1994

Gary Broadbent cleaned up in the surprisingly good winds in Swainsboro this year. Broadbent won Trick Catch (14), Fast Catch (23.91), Doubling (11), Australian Round (67). **John Gorski** was second, with seconds in Trick catch (10) and Juggling (24), and thirds in Accuracy and fast catch. Third went to Pennsylvania native **Scott Barrett**, now living in Florida. Barrett won Endurance with 58 catches, took second in Accuracy with 38 and tallied a host of thirds places finishes. Dennis **Joyce** was 4th overall, winning Accuracy with 42 points. Hey, isn't that the event "Uncle Denny" hates because it takes "no skill"? Oh well. Dennis also shares the US record in the event, further demonstrating his complete lack of skill whatsoever.

Other strong showings included Florida's **Rich Surace** in Aussie Round (2nd place 60, tied with tourney host John Derden.) **Jesse Robertson** also came up from the Sunshine state to score 25.77 seconds in Fast Catch for 2nd. **Chicago Bob**, in his last tournament as a bachelor, tallied 2nd in Doubling and placed 5th overall. Sixteen throwers took part in the tournament.



#### BYLAWS OF THE

#### **UNITED STATES BOOMERANG ASSOCIATION, INC.**

\*\*\*

#### Preamble

The name of the corporation is the United States Boomerang Association, Inc. (USBA). The members of the USBA wish to foster all aspects of the sport of boomeranging - competition, art, and science. We wish to strengthen our association with all boomerang enthusiasts in this and other countries, to promote national and international competitions, and to establish uniform rules and regulations for these competitions.

#### Article 1: Corporate Purpose

- Sec. 1 The USBA shall be permanently and exclusively dedicated to the purposes for which it is incorporated under the laws of the State of Connecticut.
- Sec. 2 No part of the USBA's net earnings may inure to the benefit of, or be distributed to, its members, officers, or other persons, except that employees of the USBA may receive reasonable compensation for services rendered in effecting one or more of the purposes of this corporation.
- Sec. 3 The profits and surplus of the USBA, if any, shall be used to further the USBA's corporate purpose.

#### Article II: Membership

- Sec. 1 The membership of the USBA shall be composed of all individuals who have paid the yearly or lifetime membership fee.
- Sec. 2 Membership in the USBA entitles members to participate in all USBA sanctioned competitions and activities, to receive USBA notices and newsletters, to vote at annual and special membership meetings of the USBA, and to be eligible for election to the Board of Directors of the USBA.

#### Article III: Board of Directors

- Sec. 1 The Board of Directors shall consist of:
  - a) President
  - b) Vice President
  - c) Secretary
  - d) Treasurer
  - e) Five members at large

#### Sec. 2 <u>Powers</u>

The sole management, control, and direction of all corporate activities and policies and of all real and personal property shall be vested solely in the Board of Directors. The Board President may establish committees to aid in the furtherance of corporate purposes and shall appoint and remove the chairpersons of these committees. The Board shall fix the amount of the annual membership dues effective at the beginning of the corporate fiscal year. The Board shall establish all regulations and policies of the USBA, provided that they do not conflict with the Certificate of Incorporation or these Bylaws. The Board shall also select one of its members to act as a liaison for the United States Boomerang Association to the USBA newsletter, "Many Happy Returns", to assist in the coordination of articles, design, and content, and to be responsible for the timely production and distribution of the USBA newsletter.

#### Sec. 3 Election

Members of the Board of Directors shall be elected at the annual meeting annually and continue in office for one year or until their successors are duly elected. Nominations shall be solicited from the membership in the Spring issue of the USBA newsletter, or by special mailing during the Spring. All candidates nominated shall be asked to submit biographical and other information which shall be published, with voting instructions, in the Summer issue of the USBA newsletter or distributed to the membership through a special mailing during the Summer with voting instructions. Voting shall be completed, and terms for new directors shall begin by September 5 of each year. Each member of the USBA may cast one vote for a candidate for each of the four offices on the Board of Directors and one vote for a candidate for each of the five at large seats on the Board of Directors. The candidates receiving a plurality of votes cast for each of the four offices shall be elected and the five candidates receiving the highest number of votes for the members at large seats shall be elected.

#### Sec. 4 Nominations

The Board of Directors shall solicit from the general membership a slate of nominees for the subsequent Board of Directors which shall be published a reasonable time prior to the end of the fiscal year. <u>Under</u> no circumstances shall members be given less than 15 days to vote from the date nominations are mailed.

#### Sec. 5 Removal

Any member of the Board of Directors may be removed by a two-thirds vote of the members voting at any special meeting of the USBA.

#### Sec. 6 Vacancy

In the case of a vacancy on the Board of Directors for any cause the remaining Directors, by a majority vote, shall elect a successor to serve the unexpired portion of the term. The Vice President shall assume the duties of the President if that office becomes vacant until such time as a successor is elected.

#### Sec. 7 Limit in Terms

There shall be no restrictions on the number of terms an individual may serve in any position on the Board.

#### Article IV: Duties of Officers

#### Sec. 1 President

The President shall serve as the chief executive officer of the USBA, preside at all meetings of the USBA and all meetings of the Board of Directors, and be responsible for the faithful execution of the business and purposes of the USBA as set out in the Certificate of Incorporation and these Bylaws. He/She shall perform such other duties as may from time to time be assigned by the Board of Directors.

#### Sec. 2 Vice President

The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in his/her absence, shall be responsible for the timely production and distribution of the USBA newsletter, and shall be responsible for all publicity involving USBA events. He/She shall perform such other duties as may from time to time be assigned by the Board of Directors. The Vice President shall be in charge of selecting the site for the following year's National Tournament, subject to a vote of the Board of Directors.

#### Sec. 3 Secretary

The Secretary shall record the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors and the membership and shall maintain a current book of minutes of all corporate proceedings. The Secretary shall be the custodian of all official records of the USBA. The Secretary shall give due and proper notice of Board and membership meetings and perform all other duties normally incident to the office.

#### Sec. 4 Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be the chief financial officer of the USBA, responsible for receipt and disbursement of USBA funds, maintenance of proper records of all accounts receivable and payable, supervision of USBA contracts, and other such duties normally incident to the position of Treasurer of a corporation. The Treasurer is responsible for the preparation, execution and filing of all financial reports and audits as required by federal and state law and regulation. The Treasurer shall prepare once a year quarterly a financial report of the USBA's financial status for distribution to each member of the Board. The Treasurer shall prepare a balance sheet at intervals of not more than twelve three months showing the financial condition of the corporation as of a date not more than four months thirty days prior thereto and a statement of receipts and disbursements for twelve three months preceding such date. The Treasurer shall send membership renewal notices at the beginning of each fiscal year to each member prior to the expiration date of the membership and keep accurate records of current USBA membership.

#### Sec. 5 Members at Large

The five members at large shall be responsible for coordination of special projects and activities of the USBA when so directed by the Board of Directors.

#### Article V: Meetings

#### Sec. 1 Annual Meeting

An annual meeting of the membership shall be held <u>during the Summer months</u>. Notice of the time and place of the meeting, the slate of nominees for the Board of Directors, and the meeting agenda shall be sent to all members a reasonable time prior to the end of the fiscal year.

#### Sec. 2 Special Meetings

Special membership meetings shall be held at any time upon written request of 10% of the membership or upon majority vote of the Board of Directors. Upon request for a special meeting as aforesaid, the President shall forthwith call such meeting within fifteen days of receipt of the request. Notice of the time, place, and purpose of the meeting shall be given in writing to all members at least ten days in advance of the meeting and no business can be transacted other than that which appears in the notice.

#### Sec. 3 Board of Directors Meeting

The Board of Directors shall meet at least every four months at a time and place or manner specified by the President. Notices for such meetings shall be mailed or telephoned at least three weeks prior to the meeting. A telephone conference call, or ballot mailing is considered a proper and adequate means of conducting such meeting. The Board of Directors shall meet immediately after within two weeks of the annual membership meeting to set the membership fee, budget, and program of work for the following fiscal year. Monthly correspondence by the President or his/her agent shall be considered the monthly-Board meeting required.

#### Sec. 4 Conduct

The President, or in his/her absence the senior officer there present, shall conduct all membership and Board meetings. The Secretary, or in his/her absence a person duly appointed by the presiding officer, shall record minutes. Meetings shall be conducted pursuant to Roberts Rules of Order.

#### Sec. 5 Voting

Each member of the USBA may cast one vote in person or by proxy on each matter submitted to the membership for action.

An affirmative majority vote at any general, special, or Board of Directors meeting at which a quorum is present shall be necessary for any corporate action.

#### Article VI: Quorum

- Sec. 1 A quorum to do business at any meeting of the membership shall be 10% of the membership.
- Sec. 2 A quorum to do business at any meeting of the Executive Board shall be four five members of the Board.
- Sec. 3 A quorum to do business my mail ballot shall be 10% of the membership.

#### Article VII: Fees

Sec. 1 The annual membership fee for each member shall be payable to the USBA, Inc., and shall be paid annually.

#### Article VIII: Dissolution

Sec. 1 Upon dissolution, all assets shall first be used to discharge all obligations of the corporation. Any remaining assets shall be distributed to the Museum of Flight, Seattle, Washington, a non-profit corporation exempt from income tax under Sec. 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended, and/or any other similarly exempt non-profit organizations.

#### Article IX: Amendments

Sec. 1 These Bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the general membership, <u>or by mail ballot</u>, provided notice of the proposed change shall be sent to all members at least 30 days prior to the meeting and two-thirds of the members voting at the meeting vote to adopt the amendment.

#### Article X: Archives

Sec. 1 The Smithsonian Institution shall be the official custodian of the USBA archives.





West Hartford Conn., Hosted by the Wandering Nutmeg Boomerang Society. The throw was spectactular with 15 veteran throwers haosting the event.



# THE SOLUTION TO A DESIGN PROBLEM

By Ed B. Russell

When the outlines of boomerangs have the angle of the elbow less than 70 degrees, the wash from the leading arm as it meets the trailing arm can affect its performance.

The advantage can be nullified by separating the planes of each by attaching them at the elbow with a lapjoint, see sketch of lapjoint.

This comment only applies to two bladers made from plywood no thicker than 4 mm., which can be glues with adhesive such as epoxy resin. Not plas-

tics such as polythylene nor polypropylene which resist epoxy. The sketch of the lapjopint section shows how airflow is taken care of by fillets in the corners, made with epoxy.


An experiment was performed using the lapjoint procedure with five designs having the angle of the elbow less than 70 degrees, each made from 4mm marine 3 ply. The arms of every shape were arranged so that the grain of the 3 ply ran lengthwise to provide strength and stiffness.

The photo A-E shows the five boomerangs, A is J. Schlegel's Old faithful, less storkorpers, wt, 55 gms, angle 55 degrees: B isDimana's T>L> Poquet's


Spinracer, wt. 33 gms, 46 degrees; C is Dimana's Atlas #6, wt. 39 gms, 30 degrees; D is Jim Mayfields Matterhorn, wt. 50 gms, 33 degrees; E is T.W. Smiths's Scissortail, wt. 47 gms, 45 degrees.

Photo F show the corners of the elbows rounded to lessen air resistance due to double thickness of joint.


Oddly enough, while the orginal Matterhorn required weights at the tips, the 4 mm model needed none. Neither did the Scissortail, which proved to be a first class boomerang. Photo G of the un-






derside of the other three shows how coins were fixed. The now out of circulation Austrailian 2 cent pieces weighed 5 gms while the 1 cent was half that weight.

All were succesful flyers in lights breezes, so the lapjoint elbows were appropriate alternatives to some rangs' instead of being made in one piece.

The idea was not original. Some time ago, Brian Kemp commended that a lapjoint elbow could be used on a "Midge" MTA, 50 degree elbow boomerang, instead of placing twist on the trialing arm and this change worked very well. So the above solution is merely an extension of the lapjoint idea to boomerangs having angles less than 70 degrees.




