

USBA Auction a Smash!

Rev Jim Makes Highest Bid, \$200 On Bonin Trick Catch Poster

MINNEAPOLIS- The annual USBA auction, held at Nationals on August 19, raised \$2022.13, the most money raised at the annual auction since the St Louis auction in 1992.

Items bringing the largest bids included a limited edition Didier Bonin lithograph poster showing 50 trick catches that was purchased for \$200 by Rev Jim of St Louis. Meanwhile, Gary Broadbent cleaned out the Rusty Harding donations, purchasing a 1981 Tomohawk boom, the seventh one made by Harding (\$110), as well as a 1980 Rusty Harding Hurricane Hook (\$100), but a Harding "Concept 70 V" boom was won by John Koehler in fierce bidding for \$100.

Other 'rangs bringing exceptional bids included a Fred Malmburg lap joint (\$111), an Ola Wahlburg Aussie Round boom (\$75), a broken Herb Smith phenolic made for the B-Man (\$65), a Norm Kern series of booms that makes a fish when put together(\$65), and a one-of- a kind boom calendar (\$75), which featured a different full-color classic boom from one of the legends for each month.

MHR serves as a focal point for the numerous clubs and individuals who throw and build around the U.S. and the world. Boom Fragments Bits of news from around the world

AUSTRALIA- The legendary Australian Boomerang craftsman Arthur Janetski passed away unexpectedly on August 4, after a brief hospital stay.

According to Bruce Čarter, of the BAA, Arthur was in fine spirits and ready to go home from the hospital when Bruce visited him a month earlier. The cause of his sudden death is unknown.

Arthur was the brother and partner of Les Janetski, who died in 1992. Les constructed and Arthur hand painted the trademark boomerangs that the two referred to as the "Rolls Royce" of boomerangs. Well known for their quality craftsmanship, their 'rangs were already valued collectors items before Les' death. In recent years, Janetski boomerangs have sold for hundreds of dollars.


French Boomerang Museum To Move

Night Flights A Hit Down Under






15 Minutes Of Fame


With the notoriety generated by last year's U.S. Boomerang Team's MTV appearance, and Barnaby Ruhe's Tonight Show spectacle, its no wonder boomerangs are receiving unprecedented press coverage lately.

The Akron Beacon Journal featured a full color front page "Local" section photo and story on Mike Dickson and his Toss Across America activities in May (See below).

A month later, **The New York Times** ran a comprehensive article on the physics of flying toys in its Science Times section (June 20, 1995). In it the evolution of **Eric Darnell's** Tri-Fly, as well as the principles of boomerang flight in general were covered in depth. 15 year-old **Adam Ruhf**'s stint as competitive boomeranging's top-ranked thrower drew the attention of the **Daily Hampshire Gazette**, which ran a feature article, and two color photos of the young star showing his stuff. The article also discussed the coaching relationship of Adam's father, former world champion, **Larry Ruhf** (Below, right).

Country Living, the official publication of Ohio Rural Electric Cooperatives, ran a feature article prior to the Delaware, Ohio tournament in its July issue. The article featured Alan Winterrowd's photos of **Chet**, the Jet, as well as **Steve Kavanaugh** and **Michael Gel Girvin**. 
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Right: Recent Sherman cartoon. Lower Right: Daily Hampshire Gazette. Left: Akron Beacon Journal.

New Guy has Questions for the Pros

Shoulder Work Ahead

Ouestion: I have pain in the shoulder and elbow: It has improved considerably since the first week (I did a stupid thing and threw for 3 hours my first day) but it's still there. Is the pain (a) normal for a beginner and transient, (b) normal and chronic, or (c) abnormal and a sign that I'm doing something wrong. I'm willing to deal with whichever is the right answer, I'd just like to know. And if the answer is (c), what do I need to do?

Shoulder Maintenance Advice

Hi Louis,

I also throw 4-5 times a week at lunchtime and then at least 1 3-hour marathon session on the weekend. And most of the time my arm feels fine. However, when my arm does get sore I can trace it back to either not enough warm-up / warm-down or poor throwing technique the day before.

To warm-up I take my Wind gauge (A 3.5 foot dowel) and use it to stretch my upper arm. One good stretch for me is placing my right arm over the shoulder and directly behind my head. I then place my left arm behind my back and reach up until the fingers on both hands interlock. I then just gently pull down stretching the right arm muscles. After that I take the wind gauge again and use it as a javelin and throw it lightly into the ground. With each successive throw I throw it a little harder. After a few throws I pickup a really light boom and throw it for a few minutes. After that my arm is ready to go!

Poor technique also can make my arm ache. If I don't properly "follow through" when throwing bigger booms my arm will feel like

it wants to fall off. Not following through for my throwing style means that I did not take a step with the throw or on the release not letting my arm flop down in front of me (picture a baseball pitcher's motion...).

For warm-down I use the same stretch outlined above and again use my wind gauge as a javelin.

The most important rule though is, if your arm starts hurting quickly fix the motion that is causing it to hurt or stop throwing for the day. If you spend an afternoon throw fast catches or big aussie round booms you might want to take a day off in similar fashion to Baseball pitchers who after 90-120 pitches in a game do not throw at all the next day.

Anyway, these are my arm pain impressions after 16 years of throwing hard and not having to have a rotator cup surgically repaired :) Get outside and throw!

Graphite Better For Pencils

I am having success throwing wood booms like Gels, Colorado Boomerangs, and others, but I have two graphite rangs from France: a Spinback 44 and another whose name escapes me. I can't seem to get them to come back. They seem to fly the right direction, but run out of steam before they get back. I've tried in no wind to 15 mph. I've tried the whole range from directly into the wind to 90 D left. I've tried vertical to laid out throws. They are heavy compared to the wood ones, but they obviously work. Any help?

Wind Advice From The **B-Man, Himself!** Dear Gregg,

Another great issue of MHR. Looks like you've got members writing and sharing info. That is good. Contest page seems about right. Not too much detail, but enough that readers can read what happened and see if they missed a good time or not. Probably the most important part of any article is listing the names in BOLD PRINT. Nothing like stoking a bloke's ego!

Seems you have lots of questions on what 'rang is best for wind. Funny, I remember the first booms I sold were very nice in calm conditions, but terrible in winds. It wasn't until you guys began competing that we "discovered" that typical 'rangs did not work well in the wind.

What I have found works best for dealing with winds are rubber bands wrapped around the one of the wings. Cheap, quick, easy to adjust, not prone to becoming unadjusted. Quarter inch bands, like the post office uses, work well. Begin by applying band with several loose wraps and then tighten loops if less drag is needed.

As we all know, there is no perfect wind 'rang. Throwing in wind takes practice and patience. Sometimes its just not going to work. I find that thin, light 'rangs handle breezes well, if thrown with just a light flip toss and a little layover, then let the wind blow it back. Or a humpback throw... high and vertical release ... might give fair returns.

With the tri-fly in wind, an inch of lead tape at the center gives a good hover and better feel when tossed. Slight dihedral (upward bend)on two wings and anhedral (downward bend) on the third, with a high, vertical toss, lots of spin, and you'll get returns even in a storm. (Watch out for the lightning!)

My fave wind boom is Rich Surace's HY-DRA. Add the rubber band and 100% catches, even in brisk winds.

I wouldn't mind knowing just how the Aerodynamics work too - I did say I was highly interested!

You can try any of the manufacturers listed on the back page of the newsletter, Many Happy Returns, or your own Pro-Fly can be twisted to make it a left-hander (read package instructions), but you may not want to be twisting it back and fourth, just to share with your lefthanded mate. Make him buck up for his own! In the meantime, you'll find plans and articles in MHR that will help you figure out aerodynamics. The Spring, 1995 issue (#62) had a wonderful article by Norm Kern on aerodynamics. You can order it through the USBA store. Oh, and by the way, Watch how you throw that "P" word around! We don't know if we'd call Chicago Bob a professional! ed

One-Handed Gellie Catch?

Scott K's inquiry on Gel booms prompted me to wondering again about Gel's obviously different design on most of his booms, namely the unusual "recurve" shape to the elbow. Supposedly this makes them easier to catch, and I can imagine this is true for those who catch two-handed. However, since I don't have a Gel boom yet (mostly Colo. booms, and very satisfied, thank you), I have to wonder from looking at his very different design how they are for catching one-handed. Looks to me like this sort of design would have a comparatively limited interior/open space while in rotation, as compared to most other designs. Seems like this would make it harder to catch one-handed.

From throwing/catching the Condor Comp. by Colo. Booms, and comparing it with their Delicate Arch, I can see the difference in ease of one-handed catching when the design has more open space in rotation, as the DA does.

Seems like most of Gel's designs would have even less open space in rotation. Of course, the proof's in the catching, and I'm sure I'll order one before too long to give it a try.

Would be very interested to know what other one-handers think of Gel's booms...

Weighted booms

I got a Davro Trailblazer boom yesterday. According to the leaflet in the shop, it has a range of 45m. After some long walks, I finally got it to come partway back or at least fly over my head before crashing behind me.

Is this the right method with weighted booms? I used plenty of layover (30deg from horizontal) and throw 45 deg off the very slight wind. When I throw it with no layover it flies like a brick. Is a circular flight possible with one of these things, I'm getting an elliptical path at best.

Dear Steve,

Due to the small turnout at most tournaments, and the need for a minimum number of 11 throwers in order to have a tournament rated, the USBA has set up a skill level division, in order to still rate all of the throwers, and yet to let them see how they stack up against other throwers of their skill level. You can enter Novice, Open, or Sport Class. The Novice class is for kids and uses different catches, so it is not rated. The Open class is for those new throwers and anyone who is not competing to make the U.S. team. The Sport class is for veteran competitors and those who wish to make the U.S. Team. Both of these classes are rated, but the Open class competitors are separated out and stacked up against each other for the tournament. -ed

Dear Andy,

On the accuracy issue, probably 90% of throwers in the U.S. are using a form of Eric Darnell's tri-fly. Eric is very helpful and would probably be glad to fill you in on some tips for working with this boom. His address is in the back of MHR under Turning Point on the Manufacturer's listing.

Chet's accuracy boom was originally stolen from aussies Geoff Kennedy and Rob Croll in 1988. Chet tried the heavy drag airfoil to make it better for wind fast catch and accuracy. "It worked pretty good, " He says. "The addition of holes and flaps is the key," he adds.

He flaps the lift arm on the top and sometimes the trailing arm. He usually tapes lead tape under the lift arm tip only. He and I both have scores of 48 points (which is the current U.S. record) with his accuracy booms, so those Aussies must have known what they were doing? -ed


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

German G-10 Fiber Epoxy 50 meter 'Rang

Adam Muller, of Germany, came up with this devilish Aussie Round 'rang for people who have a BIG arm and would rather knock that fly off their nose with a boomerang than scratch it off. This thing screams right back ... even in wind. But it doesn't set up and it doesn't hover down. You throw a bull or else watch helplessly. And to throw a bull takes a hard, fairly vertical throw. If you've got the arm, you'll think its cool.

Muller uses 2 mm (3/32") G-10 fiberglass / epoxy. A three bladed version that Adam Ruhf and the editor made while visiting Gary Broadbent's over the summer works well also, and takes a little less arm. Contact this magazine for tips.



Eric's Modified Tri-Fly Fast Catch Adam Ruhf's U.S. Recordholding boomerang


OK, kids. If you can't make this one, you're a habitual boom buying junkie. All you need is a Darnell ABS Tri-Fly (contact Eric at Turning Point Boomerangs - in manufactur-er's listing) and a pocket knife. (No joke! The editor made a competition quality Fast Catch on the field an hour before the event a couple of years ago!)

A nice rubber drum sander will do the trick, as well. Use a rough grit to hack away the unwanted plastic and to add airfoils, then fine sand by hand.

You may need to add positive angle twist and bend wings downward to make it scream. Throw hard... like a 15 year old with a cannon strapped to his shoulder... and you might end up with the U.S. record, like Adam Ruhf did this summer. Keep it high, hard and vertical (i.e. no layover). It will go out high, then start coming down on its way around and finish up knocking your outstretched hands into your unsuspecting chest. If you make a really good one, don't worry... the blood wipes right off!

Boomerang Sport: How to Play

There are 7 standard events in boomerang competition. The simplest is **Accuracy.** It's like darts except you throw from the bullseye! You get 5 throws and total the points. A perfect score is 50. Don't touch the boomerang upon return!

A fun event is **Trick Catching.** Can you make a one-hand catch? Behind the back, under the leg and with the feet are all contested catches in competition!

Australian Round tests distance, accuracy and catching ability. A 50 meter throw gets maximum distance points, while a bullseye still scores 10 points. You get 4 points for a catch.

Fast Catch involves making 5 throws and catches as quickly as possible with the same boomerang. The World record is 15 seconds for <u>five</u> throws!

Maximum Time Aloft times the longest of 4 throws to stay in the air. The World recordin competition is just shy of 3 minutes for <u>one</u> throw!! In practice in Delaware, Ohio in August 1993 a single throw hovered over the field for 17 minutes before it descended and was caught by **the thrower!**

Endurance tests your fast catching ability over a 5 minute period. The final two events are further challenges requiring specialized boomerangs. **Doubling** involves throwing two boomerangs at the same time, catching both upon return.



Highlights From Minneapolis

MINNEAPOLIS, MN- Stuart Jones deserves all of the credit for hosting a smashing U.S. Open and National Championships in the Twin Cities over August 19-21.

Forty-seven competitors competed in the two-day U.S. Open on Saturday and Sunday, facing gusty, difficult winds on Saturday, and moderating winds on Sunday. On Monday, it was nearly indoors conditions, as the winds abated and bright blue skies ruled for the U.S. National Championships.



Breakfast Of Champions?

Japanese Poster Boy, **Nobu**, came to Minneapolis, earning the distinction of "Furthest Distance to participate." Here he displays his "Breakfast of 27th place finishers."

It was Nobu's second trip to America this summer. He wowed U.S. throwers with his specially tuned Jonas MTA that flies higher than any MTA ever seen. When asked about Romblad MTA's in general, he said, "They're not so good until you tune them."

For Nobu's secret to success, check with Gary Broadbent, who tied Nobu down and fed him Captain Crunch until the hapless kid confessed. Getting the secret out of Gary won't be that easy, though!

Chet Runs Away With 4th Open

Chet Snouffer, of Delaware, OH, started off the Open in 7th place after Fast Catch (26.07), but then won Trick Catch (31) and Doubling (29), took 5th in Accuracy (35), second in Endurance (53), third in Aussie Round (61) and fourth in MTA (39.03), to blitz the overall field.

After winning the Open, Chet decided not to defend his nine National Championship titles on Monday, instead opting to run the show from the sidelines. This must be what he meant by "retirement" in 1994. His U.S. Open performance- his third rated event for the season- vaulted him into first place overall in the USBA computer ratings system for the season.

Adam Ruhf Scorches Fast Catch

Just three weeks after smashing the U.S. fast catch record, 15-year-old **Adam Ruhf**, of Belchertown, PA, won the U.S. Open with a smoking 18.14 second round, then, in Monday's Nationals, he ripped his second sub-17 second round of the season , winning the event with 16.91 seconds. Adam repeated his second place overall performance in Monday's Nationals. When asked what he though he might be capable of throwing in fast catch, the youth replied, "15.02." (The current world record is 15.03 seconds, held by Frenchman Greg Bisieau.)

From Rags To Riches: New National Champ, John Flynn

With Chet out of the National Championships, it was **John Flynn** who won his first Nationals, taking first in Aussie Round (75), second in Endurance (57), thirds in Doubling (28) and Fast Catch (19.75), and fourths in Trick Catch (31) and Accuracy (39). His lead was so large, by the final event, MTA, that he didn't even need to throw MTA to win. In fact, he might as well not have, finishing with an 11th place score of 34.6 seconds that STILL left him 8.5 points ahead of second place Adam Ruhf (who took second place in MTA!) Most ironic of all, John's third day domi-

Most ironic of all, John's third day domination came on the heels of an inconsistent U.S. Open performance that left him in 17th place overall! Fortunately, he pre-qualified to throw in the Nationals based on his fourth place U.S. ranking as of tournament time.

Open Division


Norm Kern reportedly won the Open Division of the U.S. Open, winning Endurance (40) and Accuracy (34), to finish 9 points ahead of second place, which was a tie between **Don Frazier** and **Steve Kostrab**, according to COMPETITION UPDATE. Further review, however, shows that Steve Kostrab actually finished AHEAD of Norm in the rated portion of the tournament. It is theoretically possible that the separate OPEN division ratings caused this discrepancy, but we'll have to wait for the final word. If you're holding your breath on this one, call 911.



Craftsmanship, Design Winners

Jeff Crandle, of Toltec, Arizona won the craftsmanship category of the annual boomerang design contest. His "Mummy Cave" lap joint featured a knot in the lift arm that had been carved out to display a Mexican burial building... the Mummy Cave.

In the design category, **Michael Girvin** and **Dave Grover** combined efforts on the concept piece, "Boom Boom Boom," winning first place with a design that is best left to pictures to describe. Three strings of lettered beads join in the middle of the closed center, each strand spelling out the word, "BOOM."



Bay Area Team and Freestyle Championships

SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA, CA- Forty-three Participants, from as far away as Germany, England and Seattle, threw in the four-tournament Bay Area Team Championship series, held over a two-weekend period in mid May.

The standard USBA Team events were contested, with Team Hackey Catch and Round Rang Relay pulling the ravest reviews from throwers. In the end, Team Oakland, edged out Team Berkeley by a 1.1 point margin. Also competing were Teams from Mountain View, San Francisco, and Pacifica.

In the Team Gel Freestyle championships, consisting of Count-up, Juggling, Whoa Nelly (Australian Round, with points for trick catch), Outdoor, Indoor, and Night GLORP (like HORSE in basketball, but done with trick catches), **Mike Gel** took top honors, followed by **Steve K.** and **Julio** (from England) tying for second. **London Hoft, Jim Youngblood, and Michael Siems** rounded out the top six.

Delaware Hosts "Future-Tourney"

DELAWARE, OH- This Central Ohio boomerang hotbed hosted what many throwers called "The future of the sport" at the annual Freethrowers boomerang tournament held the last weekend in July. Saturday featured the traditional USBA rated tournament, followed by a widely acclaimed head to head tournament on Sunday.

The ninety degree heat was an appropriate setting on Saturday, as 15 year-old Adam Ruhf scorched Rob Parkin's old American fast catch record by nearly a quarter-second with a 16.5 second round.

Rob, meanwhile won the overall competition, coming from behind in the final two events to outscore Delaware's own Chet Snouffer, who finished second. The second through fifth places were separated by a mere 3 placing points, with Chicago Bob, Gregg Snouffer and John Gorski rounding out the top five. On Sunday, the second-ever Head to Head competition featured sixteen throwers, seeded in four events based on Saturday's tournament results, going head to head for prize money, with \$25 going to the winner of each event, and \$50 going to the overall winner.

In Australian Round, it was fourth seeded Gregg Snouffer who won the cash, outscoring eleventh seeded Mike Dickson in the final round 30 points to 26 on three 40-meter throws that are scored for catch and accuracy.

Trick Catch (a combination of trick catch and doubling throws) went to Gary Broadbent, the sixth seed, who overcame a broken foot-catch 'rang in his semifinal round to go on and beat twelfth seeded Dave Barrett in the final round.

Maximum Time Aloft was a run-away for fourth-seeded Nobu, from Japan, who pulled out a juiced up Jonas Romblad which he had tuned for superior height. Unable to use it the previous day due to wind conditions, he devastated the competition in the best-of-three rounds, blanking every one of his opponents 2 to 0, starting with Tony Brazelton, then John Gorski, Adam Ruhf, and finally Chet.

The first place cash for Fast Catch was won by second seeded Chet Snouffer, who out-paced a speedier top seeded Adam Ruhf in the final match. But the youngster dropped his third catch and fell to the five catches-in-a-row veteran.

In the end, Chet came from behind in the final event, Fast Catch, to snatch the overall purse from younger brother, Gregg, with a total of 10 wins to Gregg's 9 for the tournament. Tied for third were Adam and Gary B with 7 wins apiece.

Throwers and spectators alike were pleased with the dramatic format.

1995 Competition Season Wrap-up

Chet Regains Top Spot

In a season that saw one hundred forty-four competitors throw in 22 tournaments, a familiar face bobbed to the top of the heap.

Less than one year after announcing his retirement from the sport, **Chet Snouffer** regained competitive boomeranging's top spot from 1994 champ, **Mark Weary**. Chet competed in just three tournaments, taking two firsts and a second place finish.

John Flynn earned second place, overall, skillfully working the ratings system, with performances that included a first, second, fourth, and fifth place finish, and even overcoming a 17th place finish in the U.S. Open (before coming back and winning the Nationals the next day.)

The third through twelfth place finishers were separated by little more than 10 points, lending suspense to the final tournament of the season, the October 14th Emmaus, Pennsylvania tournament. That event attracted 29 throwers from across the country, seeking ratings points in a mad jockey to make the notorious "Top 12," from which the two U.S. teams will be drawn for the New Zealand World Championships coming up in March. Unfortunately, the Pennsylvania Tournament was rained out after the first event, MTA, leaving some disappointed and some relieved competitors, who's places "on the bubble" would now be secure.

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
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
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
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You Sure That's 50?

Barnaby Ruhe, at his October 14 tournament, was questioned about the proximity of a light pole located near the 50 meter circle, which, according to USBA standards, must have 10 meters clear around the outside. Barnaby responded by taking a 50 meter 'rang, walking to the 10 meter line around the bullseye and throwing it. **The boom smashed directly into the light pole... 50 meters away!**

Hey Bunny, How Do You Throw This Thing?

At September's Connecticut tournament, **Barnaby Ruhe** convinced **Moleman** to try his new **Ola Walberg** "V," even though he was unfamiliar with it and had trouble getting fifty meters range with it.

For his first throw, he caught what appeared to head judge Rob Parkins to be an 18 point catch in the 8 point circle. Mole corrected him, saying his toe had actually touched the 7 point line... the catch was worth only 17 points.

With his next throw, he backed up, thinking the boom would fly over his

head. Instead, it hit the brakes and dropped in front of him, causing a scramble to get to it in front of the bullseye... for 8 points accuracy... an 18 point catch.

He looked over at **Barnaby** for guidance on how to judge the flight for the catch. Barnaby just winked at him.

His third throw he jumped into the bullseye for a 20 point catch. For his fourth he caught the boom with his toes in the bullseye, his body leaning outward in a slow fall after the catch... another 20.


With his last throw, he found himself straddling the 9 point line, with one foot in the 10 and one in the 8 point circle. As the boom approached, just before catching, he lifted his right foot off the ground, leaving his bullseye foot as the only point of contact when the catch was made... another 20... and a new World Record score of 95 points.

Under Barnaby Ruhe's tutelage, Mole first learned how to throw his Ola boomerang correctly, in order to get fifty meters, **during the event warm-up period!**

Speaking Of Moleman...

At July's Emmaus, PA tournament, Moleman tossed an MTA up to watch it immediately stabilize and drift FOR-WARD, not back, with the prevailing wind, as Mole thought it would.

As the boom rose and drifted toward a line of trees in front of the circle, everyone was convinced it would surely be munched by the trees. Instead, it halted its approach a few meters from the upper branches, hung there for several seconds, and then began a slow, steady retreat back toward the circle and the waiting arms of Moleman. It settled down just 20 meters downwind of where he threw it...one minute and nineteen seconds later... the best score of the season, and just six seconds short of the world record!
