Alien Grid Lines Missing

The one inch grid lines in builder's square were unintentionally left out. The wingtip on the enlarged boomerangs should be approximately 13 inches on the "Radified Mantis," and 10.5 inches on the easy throw model. Don't get too hung up on exact sizes. A slightly smaller boom made of 4mm may fly better for you that a full size 5mm model. You never know and can get even a relatively close size a shape to fly perfectly, depending on your airfoils.

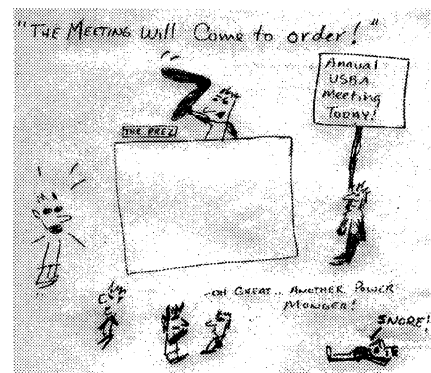

These Rangs Are For The Dogs!

Below is the text of a note which someone posted in the CNN TalkBack Live Forum. Why they posted it there, I'm not sure. Not only was the decision to post in that forum rather odd, but the message itself is certainly unique. The person who posted the message claims this is the story of how boomerangs came into being. Have you ever heard this theory??

"It has recently been discovered that early Labrador Retrievers (as in the dog) invented the boomerang. Sick of chasing sticks, they discovered that if they chewed the ends of certain sticks in a particular way, the sticks, when thrown, would angle back towards them, re-

ducing the distance they had to run to retrieve the stick. Eventually, sticks were chewed in such a way as to complete the boomerang effect, returning the stick to the owner without the dogs having to move an inch. Early hominids, obsessed with throwing sticks, soon forgot about the dogs and simply threw the sticks to themselves. One day, totally by chance, a bird flew into a boomerang and was killed, which led to the boomerang's conversion from a recreational tool to a hunting tool. Seems strange, and yet it did indeed happen."

Dear Sparky,

For most boomerang enthusiasts, this account is truly humourous. However, for the layperson, it is presented as fact, and so is quite remarkable, yet completely misleading. The textbook theory goes like this:

A while back (23,000 years or more), pre-historic man discovered, perhaps at first by accident, and then through trial and error, that sticks and stones made better hunting tools than bare hands. At some point, these objects' projectile value was discovered, after which time, they were thrown at quarry. It would be natural to throw large clubs sidearm at prey. Then, perhaps by accident, it was discovered that a bent stick spun better than a straight stick and maintained better stability in flight (a characteristic later described as the law of gyroscopic stability). A smooth-worn stick was found to fly further than a rough one (deceased drag) And finally, aerodynamic lift was discovered (probably startlingly so) when someone's worn stick developed a curved top and under side, like a wing, and amazingly defied gravity to travel considerably farther than anyone else's had ever flown before.

It seems as if Captain Cook interrupted Aborigines in the midst of this sort of early accuracy tournament when he mistakenly got the idea that these returning boomerangs were used to hunt with. Actually, the larger non-returns were used for that purpose, but the language barrier made it difficult for Cook to understand. Hence the misconception still lingering all of these years later!

There is another theory; one that I find more interesting. That being the idea that the gift of flight (the airfoil) was given to man by some civilization that already understood

those principles and used them to visited here many years ago across great distances through space. If early man was awed by these extraterrestrials, considerably more than the concept of flight might be explained, including theism, mankind's continued curiosity in the search for extraterrestrial life and UFOs. Like I said, its a lot more interesting... but I like this dog theory too!

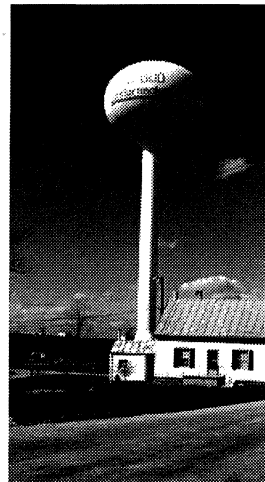

Dear Greg,

Thanks for your recent letter concerning boomerangs and the sport of booming. I don't know if the reasons for booming would make sense to someone who hasn't tried it or participated in the tournaments, but I'll try.

My brother and I got into booms when I was 7 and he was 12. We were into kites and frisbees and water rockets and stuff that flew, so there was a natural attraction. My brother's first boomerang was built in Grandpa's garage with some leftover paneling from the basement. Anyway, it curved and that's all that mattered. He started building them and throwing and I basically just went along with it.

By my Junior year in High School, we learned of an annual boomerang fling on the Washington DC Mall by the Washington Monument. Our folks loaded us up in the car and we made a vacation out of it. Responses To Last Issue

MHR Editor,

Regarding the John Gorski 17+ minute MTA flight in August 1993, it was submitted to the Guinness Book later that year as a feat,

worthy of mention as an "unofficial" record, with all supporting documentation that was gathered that day. The Guinness Book requires that all records be set during the course of scheduled, sanctioned competitions, such as USBA tournaments, German or French tournaments, international tournaments, like the World Championships, etc. (For example, if Carl Lewis long-jumps 35 feet during a practice effort, it is not the Record, even though "he did it." Guinness applies the same logic to boomerangs.)

Documentation that official rules have been observed, exact times or distances recorded, witnesses, tournament directors, etc. are standard requirements. And that is no guarantee that the record will be published. Guinness editors are faced with many decisions regarding what to include and what not to include in their book. They know everything there is to know about John's throw; it is up to them to decide whether it should be published.

As for Michael Chellucci's **NEGATIVE EXPERIENCE**, I would like to extend an invitation to New Hampshire for the July 13 tour-

namment at Kimball Union Academy. While I can't help with the weather or the length of the day, I can assure him that the lines will be on the field when he arrives, and there is a Novice award up for grabs.

This would help with things like learning to spot the 20 meter line, how to judge and score trick catch, how to time MTA and fast catch, etc., as well as to help them feel welcome and accepted.

At some point during the day, a break could be held when Boom Buddies break out in a pro-am style to enjoy the sport in a casual atmosphere truly reflective of the founding spirit of boomin' in the USA.

USBA SUPER NOVICE RULES

Rules for Super Novice Events

Objectives

Provide a positive recreational and learning setting for beginning throwers. (Make sure everyone has fun!) These events can be used for a separate event or for beginner events in association with a veteran USBA tournament.

These rules provide an environment where throwers of all ability levels can participate and be challenged so they can also be used with throwers who are beyond the beginner stage, but should be used only with a group of throwers of roughly the same ability level.

General Rules

Individual scores are calculated for each event in the same way as in normal USBA tournaments. The event winner receives 11 points, with the second place receiving 9 points, third 8 points, and so on. In the event of ties, the resulting points are divided equally between the tied participants. For example, a two way tie for second place would split the second and third place points and receive 8.5 each. A participant's tournament score is the total of their event scores.

One sighter throw IS allowed before beginning each event/round for each participant.

Thrower must make a good faith attempt to throw in such a manner so as to create gyroscopic precession.

There is no minimum distance required for Super Novice boomerangs. Veteran throwers are expected to use 20 meter boomerangs. In the interest of safety, veteran throwers should not use their advanced technology boomerangs, such as paxolin, or world class fast catch boomerangs.

There are several events listed below. You may select as many or as few as is appropriate for the time, space, and throwers at your event.

Note-These rules allow most events to be run without marked circles. Throwing points may be marked with rags, or throwing discs. To provide a more permanent throwing point, throwing discs may be spiked to the ground. Accuracy may be measured with a tape measure or a previously marked rope.

Trick Catch

Each participant throws 8 consecutive throws. Any style catch may be attempted on any throw. Points for catches are as follows:

Any touch = 1 Point (not allowed for veterans)

Any catch = 2 Points (not allowed for veterans)

rans)

One handed catch or trap = 3 Points

One handed overhand = 4 points

Behind the back or Under the leg = 5 Points

One handed behind the back or under the leg = 7 points

Foot/leg catch = 10 Points

The participant's score is the total of points awarded for all touches and catches. Multiple throwers may throw simultaneously, but they should throw on command to allow accurate recording of scores for each throw. Great latitude should be given regarding the achievement of the more difficult catches. Disallowing a leg catch because it touches the thigh, is not appropriate in a Super Novice event.

Fast Throw

Each participant throws 5 times. The stop watch is started upon the first release and stopped after the fifth throw and when the participant returns to the start point in possession of the boomerang. For safety sake, thrower must make second through fifth throws from near (within approximately 2 meters of) the throwing point. Catching is not required on any throw. There is only one round. Shortest time wins.

Fast Throw Endurance

Each participant throws for 2 minutes. Catching is not required on any throw. The timer should warn the thrower(s) at 1 minute, 30 seconds, 15 seconds remaining, and should count down the final 10 seconds. Each throw must be made from near (within approximately 2 meters of) the throwing point. The score is equal to the number of throws which are initiated before the 2 minutes expire.

MTA Limited

Any boomerang may be used with the exception of an MTA. Each thrower throws three consecutive throws. A stop watch starts when each throw is released and stops when thrower first touches the boomerang or when it touches the ground. Score for each throw equals the elapsed time plus 2 seconds if boomerang is touched, and 4 seconds if it is caught. Participant score equals the longest of the three adjusted times (including the seconds for touching or catching). Longest adjusted time wins.

Accuracy

Each participant throws five consecutive throws. After the sighter throw, the thrower may elect to count it as their first throw. Thrower may not touch Boomerang until it comes to rest. Distance is measured from a

throwing point or the center of the throwing ring to the point of the boomerang (where it came to rest) closest to the center.

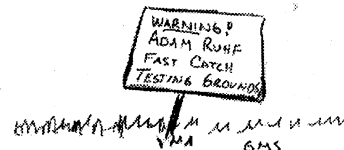
Points are awarded as follows:

within 2 Meters = 10 points
within 4 Meters = 8 points
within 6 Meters = 7 points
within 8 Meters = 6 points
within 10 Meters = 5 points
within 12 Meters = 4 points
within 14 Meters = 3 points
within 16 Meters = 2 points

Participant's score equals total of all throws. (If there are marked circles on the field, they may be used with the normal USBA scoring. Measuring distance to the point of the boomerang closest to the center is somewhat simpler, and will boost the scores.)

MTA Aussie Round

Any boomerang may be used with the exception of an MTA. Each participant throws three consecutive throws from the throwing point. A stop watch starts when each throw is released and stops when thrower first touches the boomerang or when it touches the ground. The score for each throw equals the number of seconds the boomerang is in the air, plus 2 points if boomerang is touched, and 4 points if it is caught anywhere on the field, plus the accuracy points as listed in Accuracy above. Award accuracy points based on the point where the thrower contacts the ground at the time of the touch or catch. If there are multiple points of contact score based on the point which is closest to the throwing point. Participant score equals the total points for all throws. Highest number of points wins. (To further simplify this event, you may omit the timing and award points based only on accuracy and catching.) Do not run this event with a measuring rope on the field. This could be a serious safety hazard. Use marked circles, or remove the measuring tape or rope before each throw.

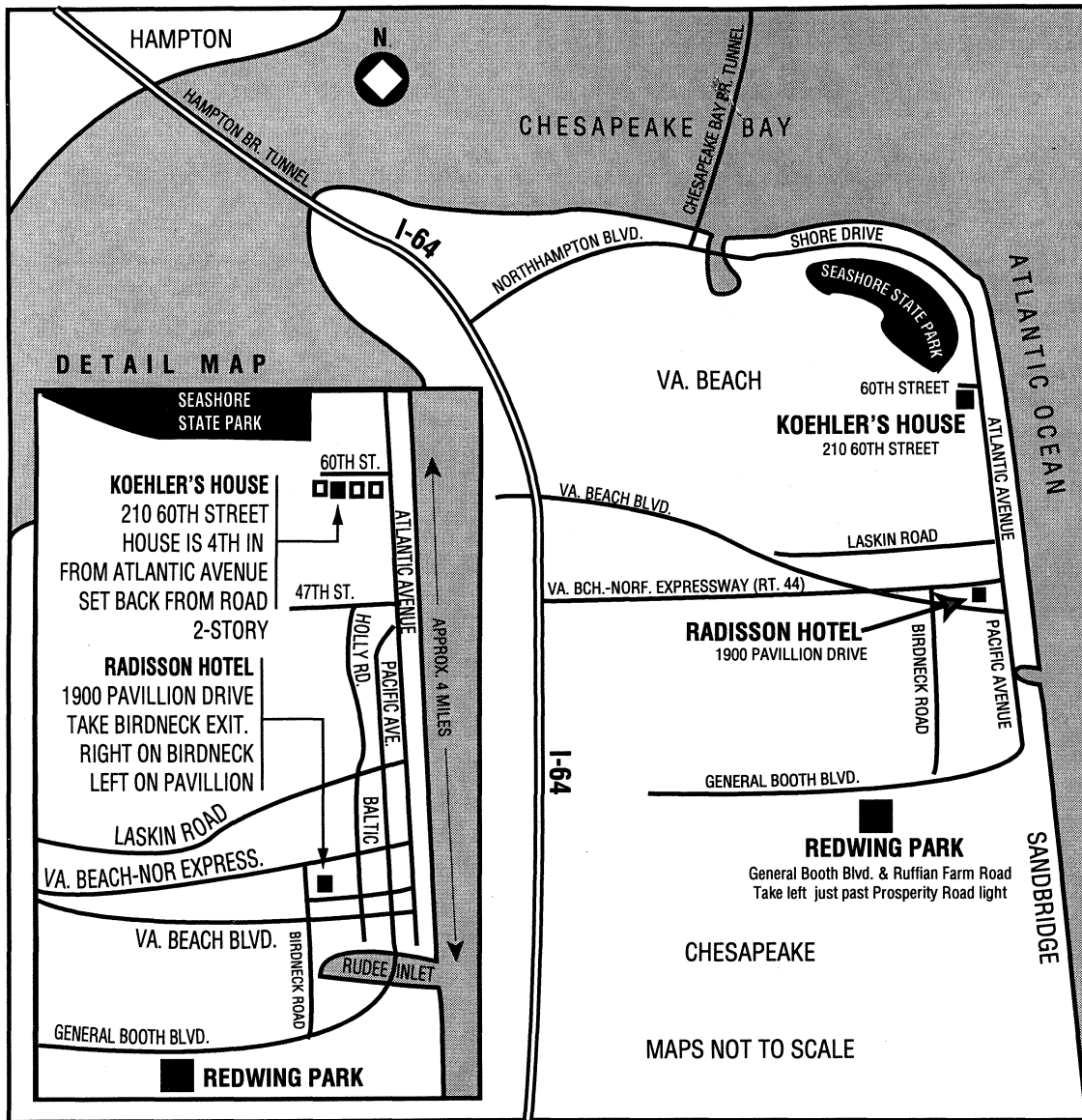

Ola Wahlberg Boomerangs Available Domestically

Over the Winter, Jim Jordan received a shipment of boomerangs from Ola Wahlberg to make available to competitors in the U.S. The sale went over well, and Ola has now sent additional 'rangs, some of which were grabbed up by an overflow of orders from the first shipment. Following is a list of what Jim has in stock. Jim also mentions that he can forward a request to Ola, or you can e-mail Ola yourself at mg11740@gaia.swipnet.se

3mm MEDIUM-V \$26 (2 in stock)

This is the little hummer that Mole Man used to score the 95 in Aussie Round. The wings are about equal in length. Weighting is necessary to make 50 meters.

4mm MEDIUM-V \$26 (6 in stock)

The dingle arm on these is about 3/4 inch longer than the throwing arm for added mechanical advantage in throwing. The angle between the throwing arm and the dingle arm is smaller. The extra thickness should produce a little more range.

4mm LARGE-V \$26 (0 in stock)

As you know, Ola's boomerangs are small in size. So, even Large is small by normal standards. However, if you don't use a pinch grip, the large-V will probably suite your style. The range is 45-48 meters.

4mm DeVe \$26 (0 in stock)

I obtained my first DeVe which was one of a kind that Ola sent to me last summer. I fell in love with it. It handled wind nicely, as the medium-V and large-V do. However, the DeVe also made 50 meters range without weighting it. The one I have will also make a complete return in no wind, so I'm looking forward to a chance to use it this tournament season.

1.75mm SNAKE MTA \$32 (6 in stock)

This is Ola's trademark MTA that you are familiar with. The throw is similar to throw-

ing a high Australian Round throw (with about 45 degrees of layover). These are best in moderate winds.

1.50mm SNAKE MTA \$32 (1 in stock)

This is a thinner and smaller (85%) version of the previously described SNAKE. Ola designed this for light to no wind conditions. This is the first I have seen these, so I have not had an opportunity to throw one. Ola said in his letter that the throw is more like a standard MTA throw, with a lot of vertical (no layover). Although smaller, the cost is the same since it takes the same amount of effort and craftsmanship.

If you want any of these, send Jim an e-mail and mail him a check made out to Ola Wahlberg. Remember to include \$3.60 for envelope/postage/ handling for the first boomerang and \$0.75 for each additional boomerang.

Ola guarantees his boomerangs and he would like to hear from you, so drop him a line about your experiences. He is planning on attending the Nationals at Virginia Beach so you may see him there.

Douglas McArthur Boomerang "Will Return"

Here's another one of those "Why doesn't that ever happen to me?" stories.

According to the BAA bulletin, **General Douglas McArthur**, while staying in Australia after his Phillipine ousting by the Japanese during World War II, was presented with an Aboriginal returning boomerang on his 63rd birthday at Australian Headquarters on January 26, 1943. The 'rang was signed by each of the 26 Australian officers staying at the headquarters where the Allies planned the triumphant return to the Phillipines.

When the General left Australia, the boomerang was left behind and became the property of his Australian housekeeper, who later passed it along to her son. He eventually decided it was of little personal value and decided to liquidate it.

According to **Boomerang News**, Issue 22, about ten years ago, the son sought out at least one boomerang enthusiast, **Doug DuFresne**, to see if he wished to purchase it. Doug let **Ted Bailey** know about the find. But by the time Ted had attempted to acquire it, the son had offered it for bid at Downies auction house to maximize its value. Australian **Tony Butz** was the eventual high bidder for the 'rang, although the BAA did not mention how much he paid for it.

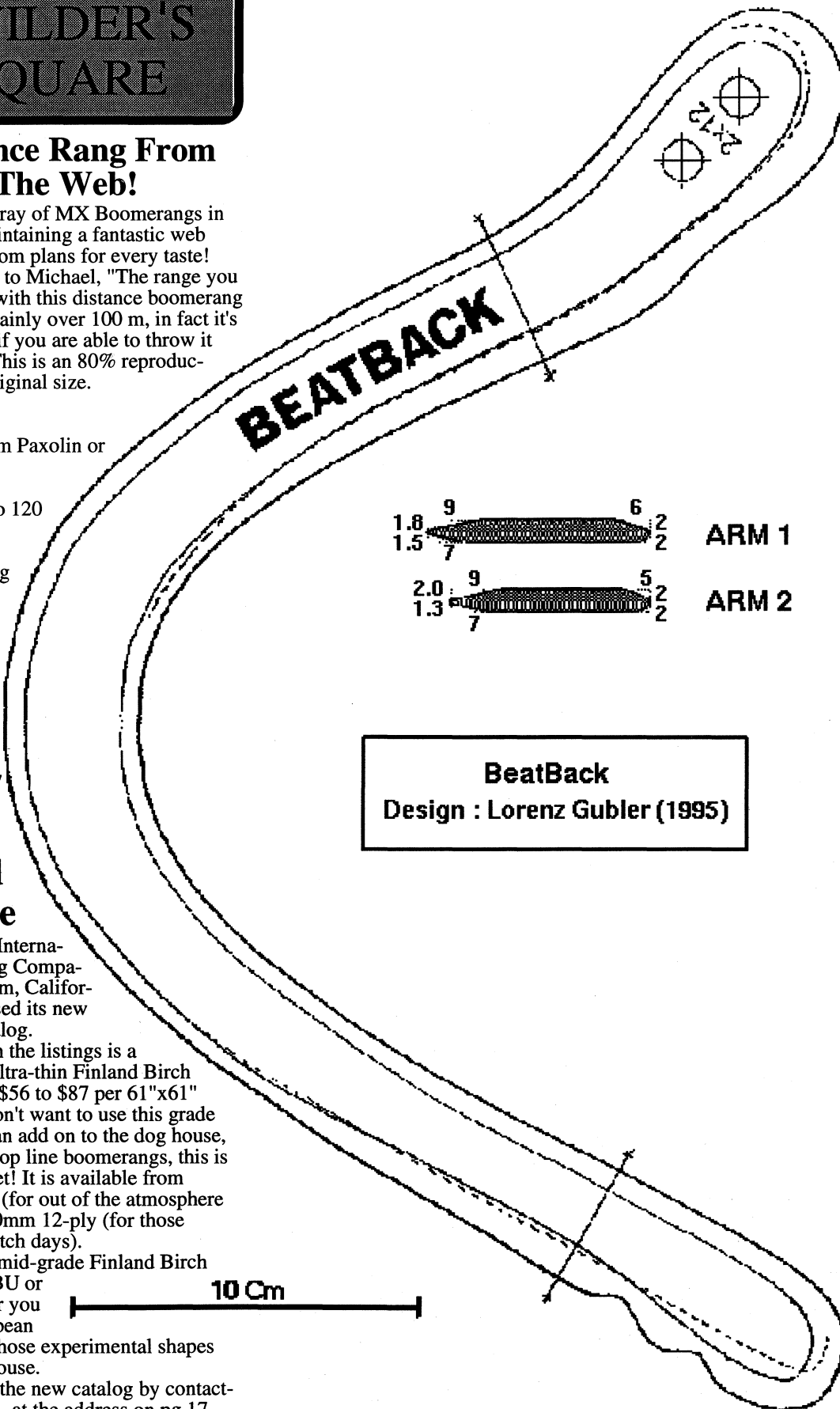
Ply-wood Update

Jim Miller On Boomerang Design Techniques

Jim Miller of Sandy, Utah runs the Wasatch Boomerang Club with about 20 members. In addition to regular flings, Jim also prints bumper stickers and T-shirts promoting the club and a local newsletter, informing members of events and keeping everyone up to date on the locals.

In his January newsletter, Jim offers advice to those wishing to design their own boomerang models.

"Boomerang designs vary as much as the people who design them. An infinite variety of shapes, angles and sizes can be incorporated into a boomerang design and almost any shape will fly," says Jim.

"The three stage design process is one graphic designers use in order to develop an idea into a finished product."

The process includes **thumbnail sketches, rough sketches, and final design.**

Making **thumbnail sketches** involves filling a paper with tiny boomerang sketches, or brainstorming with a pencil. Jim advises small, quick sketches without much detail or accuracy to slow down the creative process. "Try some crazy shapes," he encourages.

In the **rough sketch** stage, "Its time to choose, combine and refine." You can combine two or more aspects of the Thumbnails designs into one. You should "Draw larger, more accurate sketches and adjust shapes and angles through successive sketches until you get close to what you had in mind."

With the **final design**, you want to draw a full size pattern you can use as a template for your new shape. If your paper isn't big enough, tape a couple of pieces together. You can even draw directly on the wood you will be cutting. At this stage, you may want to use drafting tools such as a T-square, French curve, triangle, compass, ruler, or even a computer design program.

As Jim says, "There is great satisfaction in designing and crafting your own boomerang," and its even more fun to throw... unless it doesn't come back! (In that case, you just write "Ask The Experts" and let Norm or Gary figure it out!

Head to Head VS Traditional Tournaments

The buzzword on the boom fields is "Head To Head," as a result of a new tournament format being introduced by boomerang event promoters Gregg Snouffer and Aron McGuire. The new tournament style was featured at three venues last year and is slated for at least that many this season, including a Head to Head showdown scheduled during the U.S. Open in Va Beach! What does it all mean? Here's the scoop from Norm Kern, in a dramatic head to head comparison of Traditional Boom tournaments versus Head To Head.

What does Best really mean? - If you feel that one good MTA throw or one good fast catch round doesn't really prove enough, you will like Head to Head (H2H). To be the best in H2H you have to go through 5 elimination rounds. Each round is against someone who has made it to that round be beating people, so each round gets more difficult. To win an event you have to be consistently excellent. To win trick catch, you may have to make five foot catches, not just two.

Pressure - If you like pressure, you will like H2H. As noted above, each round gets more difficult. This is real time, so as you drop in fast catch, you can hear the count in your opponent's circle, and you know how much the drop put you in the hole. There is no second round in fast catch unless you win the first. In Aussie Round, you are both in the same 8 point circle throwing within a second of each other, and trying to get to your boomerangs at the same time. There is no long pause in the bull's eye waiting for the wind to drop. You throw when the judge tells you to. This was very hard to get used to.

Elapsed Time - If you like a fast pace, and shorter tournaments, you may like H2H. The Delaware H2H was com-

pleted in about 3 hours. Even when you are not throwing, the spectating is more fun because of the head to head drama.

Money - If you like cash prizes or off track betting, you will like H2H. A portion of the entry fees goes directly into cash prizes so you can treat the people you beat to pizza instead of lugging another lifeless trophy home or I guess you could buy your own trophy. The off track betting makes all those who bet interested in each and every round, no matter how mediocre some of us are.

Personal Bests - If you like to throw to compete against your best time, you will prefer traditional tournaments. The events are not run according to the traditional rules in H2H so you won't get 5 throws in Aussie Round, and if you are too slow you may not get to finish your fast catch round, and there might not be a watch on you anyway.

Endurance & Accuracy - If you like these events you will definitely prefer traditional tournaments. H2H does not include them, except for Accuracy as an overall tie breaker event (like doing penalty shots in soccer).

Encouragement - Unless you are recognized as one of the best, and everyone bets on you, you will prefer traditional tournaments. Even your friends will bet against you, so even they will be cheering for your opponents. You might even bet against yourself. What does that do to your incentive? In a traditional tournament for some reason people root for you even when you are about to beat them. You won't see that in H2H.

All in all, H2H seems to be a good extension to the sport. There is plenty of room for both formats. Having them back to back as they were in Delaware makes a trip more worthwhile, and makes the seeding extremely relevant and fair.

"We had 16 throwers at this last weekend's boom throwing session, the third event for our club. Some were first-timers, one just happened to be walking by, was fascinated, tossed a couple of throws, did very well, and said "I'm hooked!". He'll be back..."

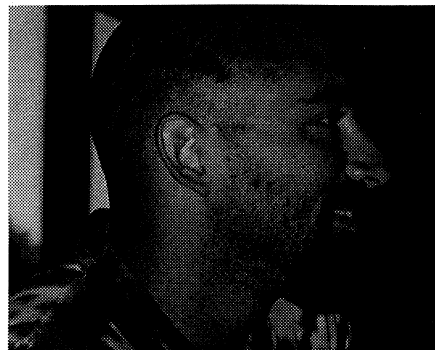
