



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

How to Tune a Snake

regard to tuning Snakes, I suggest more radical tuning than for other MTAs. All of Ola's boomerangs are hand carved, so there will be variations in how they perform. For this reason, your "problem" Snake may appear to have the same tune as the others, but it performs differently because there are other variations such as different airfoils or a different chord. Inspect them closely and you may see differences in the airfoils. These differences may be equalized by using a different tune.

MTAs in general present the greatest tuning challenge of all different types of boomerangs. What is good for one may not be good for another of the exact same make/model. You must first identify a specific problem with the flight and then make the appropriate tune change to correct it. It would seem that there are only a few things you can do to tune an MTA, but the art is in finding the correct balance to achieve the desired result for stable flight. Too much or too little of a particular adjustment will not

give you the result you need. But you should see improvements in the flight if you are headed in the right direction.

If your snake has too much range, it probably should be tuned to turn sooner. This can be accomplished by adding more positive angle of attack on the throwing arm. Don't be bashful, just don't try to do it all at once or too quickly. The paxolin can take a fair amount of bending. However, it will break without warning when you try to bend it like you are folding a piece of paper. Since the Snake's throwing arm is swept forward, a positive dihederal change at the tip will effectively be adding positive angle of attack. Twisting the wing a little further down towards the elbow (Snakes have elbows?) will also lift the tip. Some of my Snakes need more radical tunes than others (e.g. lots of dihederal vs almost flat). You have to experiment to determine how much each one needs.

The Snakes have been previously tuned by Ola for test flights. However, as with most

MTAs the Snake can get out of tune in transport or on a bad landing. So, how do you know if it is in tune when you get it? The answer first begins with knowing how to throw it. You should should start by throwing it with less power at first, to see if you can set it up in a hover on an easy throw. The throw should be approximately 30 degrees to the right of the wind, 60-70 degrees off horizontal and with a lot more layover than most wood MTAs. It is kind of a high Aussie Round style of throw. The more spin the better. You will be amazed at how easy it is to get a Snake high in the air, but an untuned Snake won't stay up long. If it goes into a sweet hover you have a tuned Snake which probably won't go out of tune until you are throwing in a tournament, where you won't have time to figure out what to do about it. That's my luck anyway.

Not hovering enough? Now's the fun part. In general, you want to keep the elbow of the Snake flat, so firmly grip the wing between your thumb and index finger while tuning the wing tip end to keep from twisting the central elbow area. Small adjustments can produce significant changes in flight, so keep your adjustments small. If the Snake is placed on a flat surface (a table) you should generally see that both wings are bent up slightly (dihedral). Sometimes, only lifting up the very tip of the throwing arm/and or dingle arm (more dihedral) will produce the desired result.

In general, the throwing arm may need some positive angle of attack which can be acheived by either twisting the last section of the wing or lifting it from the tip to the elbow since this wing is swept forward on a Snake (or a combination of both). Again, make small adjustments. As with wood MTAs, the Snake may fly better with some negetive angle of attack on the dingle arm.

Troubleshooting: This requires careful observation to determine what the Snake is doing wrong on the throw. Again, you start with was the Snake thrown correctly in the first place? A perfect tune doesn't have a chance if the Snake is thrown incorrectly. If you think you have the throw down, what is it doing wrong? Climbing too much/stalling and dropping dangerously to the ground? Perhaps there is too much angle of attack on the throwing arm or you gave it too much layover on the throw.

Experience is the best teacher.


The Effects of Technique on Stability

Whenever I try to power up my MTA in an attempt at a good flight, it crashes, or just plain never gets stable. It either snakes out quickly or does a series of descending (large) pendulum-like swings, losing maybe 10-20 feet of altitude on each successive swing. What am I doing wrong?

One of the worst things a MTA thrower can do is try to put full power into a MTA. When I used to compete, I would do great in warm ups and then bomb out in the event. It took awhile to figure out that a 100% power throw can be disasterous. You cannot control your wrist with full power. With full power, most throwers release late with your wrist lower positioned lower than your head during the release. When the MTA is released with your wrist lower than your head, there is a tendency for your wrist to twist and lay over the MTA. You can correct this some by making sure that your hand is held higher than your head at the moment of release. Most (Bailey-style) MTAs cannot tolerate even the slightest amout of layover.

My recommendations- back off on power. Add spin. Make sure your wrist is as high as you can hold it when you release your MTA. If this doesn't work, make sure your MTA is properly tuned.




TECHNICAL TIDBITS

The Effects of Aerodynamics on Stability

ne of the tricks I use on my MTAs to make them more stable is to keep the upper surface smooth and the underside rough. My theory behind this is that the air on the upper surface has to flow a longer distance than the lower surface. Therefore, when the air exits on the trailing edge, the boundary layer on the upper surface is thicker than the lower surface. This causes vortices to form and this vortex shedding results in instability. When you leave the lower surface rougher, the boundary layer is thicker and less vortex shedding occurs because the air exits on both surfaces with more similar boundary layer thicknesses. I don't have any wind tunnel testing to back this theory up, but it sure works. Also, I leave the tips and elbow rough on the upper surface to induce turbulance at these locations where stability is most likely to be a problem. Adding turbulence here stops the formation of unstable recirculation bubbles.

How to Find a Thermal

his may surprise you, but a hot day does not necessarily translate into a good MTA day. Winter is a great time to go for MTA records because the air temperature differentials are much higher in some places. If you don't believe me, go out this February (if it's cold where you live) on a sunny day and throw your MTA over a black parking lot- it's better if the lot's full of cars. Don't worry about hitting one, the rang will

never come down. Differentials in air temperature is what the MTA thrower is looking for. That's where the thermals pop up. Sailplane pilots know how to read the air and look for updrafts.

Another great time to throw is the evening following a really hot day. The air in the sky cools down quickly, but parts of the ground are still hot and cause oodles of thermals. Watch the skies for flat-bottomed

cumulus clouds (those are the fluffy ones). A flat bottomed cloud is caused by an updraft pushing water vapor above the freeze line. While this doesn't do a heck of a lot of good for earthbound MTA rangers, sometimes you can trace the updraft to something on the surface (like a parking lot full of hot cars or a bridge baking in the sun over a cool creek), and align your throw accordingly.

More practical is to look for circling raptors (hawks and eagles and, if you're near the ocean, gulls and frigates). They will often find columns of rising air and circle lazily, gaining altitude without expending the energy of a single wingbeat. Scientists believe that oceangoing frigate birds actually sleep on these columns while flying. At Chet's Delaware, Ohio tournament in 1997 there was a cluster of red tailed hawks circles.



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



USBA RATED

11th Annual Western Oregon Boomerang Roundup

Salem, Oregon July 19, 1998

Attendance was quite a let down from last year. Last year my tournament was one of the required 3 for all world cup team contenders. I had 30 or 35 throwers, which is an incredible turnout for a west coast tournament. This year, due to the Santa Barbara tournament and their long distance competition, as well as Gel's retirement, we were barely able to scrape together enough throwers for a legal tournament.

Still, everybody had a great time and a bunch of us retired to Pietro's for pizza afterwards.

It got a tad gusty. A look at the scoresheet for the 2nd round of FC shows that only one person completed 5 catches!

Highlights of the tournament included a very respectable showing in the new Trick/Doubling event by Will Gix, scoring 62 points.

High order strategy was shown in the Australian Round by Dean Kelly (me!) in skipping all those distance points and throwing a 20 meter slotted tri-blader under nasty wind conditions to take 3rd place with a score of 45 while most of the 50 meter rangs were being blown into the 'no-accuracy' zone.

First time MTA thrower Tim Mathison posted a very respectable 31.76 second throw under tricky conditions to take 5th place in MTA.

Will & Betsy made for an awesome duo taking 9 top 3 finishes in the individual events and 1st and 4th respectively in the overall.

And lets not forget the biggest benefit of a small tournament- we were done with awards and off the field by 5pm! On that I have to give a lot of credit to Diane DuFresne who was head judge and chief statistical compiler.

All together a lot of fun. We're all looking forward to the next northwest tournament, Summer's Final Fling in Portland, this year under new management by Tim Shallberger. And we all look forward to the 12th installment of the Western Oregon Boomerang Roundup next year.

4th Annual Community Park Under the Lights Tournament

Emmaus, Pennsylvania August 29-30, 1998

Two tournaments: August 29, 3-11 pm; August 30, 9 am - 3 pm.

The first tourney started early afternoon. To kick it off, Fred Malmberg hoisted a mountain of an MTA for 35.66 for 3rd place. Dan Clason-Hook with an enormous effort edged the good doctor with a 36.66 and seemed to hold the day. But Scott Barrett begged a Jonas off of Ruhedog for his last toss, getting three tips on how to switch from a Paxolin Ola Wahlberg Snake including "don't throw it too hard" and the good student popped a 37.08.

Mike Forrester was typical in Aussie Round, winning with a 71 in tight quarters and taking an early lead on the day. Larry Ruhf's 69 held second and proved his intensity. Bart Flynn's 18 points was fantastic.

The weird Doctor Ruhe proved out his theory that Accuracy need not be our Achilles Heel in team cup if certain fundamentals are addressed, with a wining 43. Larry Ruhf's second and Forrester's third kept Mike in the lead and Larry no joke on the day.

Flynn's 69 in Endurance, with some drops, would auger will for his crusher in New Hampshire. Adam (67) and Barrett (62) shadowed him. Ruhedog (60) anchored the 60s squad with no drops, in an attempt to nip the Darnoulli.

Adam was pathetic with a mere 14.90 in

Fast Catch under the lights. No one actually saw the boomerang but several on the line felt a strange buzzing in their ears. Mole's 19.02 was distant thunder and good for 2nd. Kavanaugh's 19.44 was more of an eye-opener for me. Scott began his big move on the day with a 20.18.

He was ready to quit after 300 but Mike Barrett coached him to toss the skating boom differently from the setting one so Adam wouldn't have to run right-left-right-left. With that kink smoothed out Adam was the Energizer Bunny.

So the awards ceremony was moved onto the field next to Adam - still going - and the crowd turned to Adam who, with lots of distraction to help him, was able to manage a drop at 439. An opportunity was lost: to form a circle around him and chant out the number. Adam, I pledge to set up such a circle next time you toss in the event.

European system found Kavanaugh and Barrett tying for first overall. USBA system moved Adam up from third to second, kept Ruhe third and dropped Kavanaugh down to fourth, showing that Team Cup thinking, which needs consistency more than splash, needs Stevie K. Darnell copped fifth and with his second overall the next day, proved he is a man for all seasons. Forrester at sixth and third overall as the shadow man. Steady. Barrett's first and third over the two days of touneys put him in serious consideration for teamplay.

Flynn at seventh took revenge by winning the second tourney. He won MTA with a very real 39.47 to nip Forrester by 0.38. Jim Jordan's 37.62 was a handsome third. 4th Annual Illinois Open

Champaign, Illinois September 6, 1998

Conditions: Wind 7-13 mph. Mostly sunny. As the wind gods continued to look with disfavor upon the Illinois Open for the fourth year in a row, Jason Smucker (Atlanta, Georgia) captured his first ever USBA title.

Despite veteran competition from the likes of Spike Frazier, Billy Brazelton, Mike Gabriel, Aaron Kaminski, Tony Brazelton and Mike Dickson, Jason battled the winds for no less than fourth place in every event but Fast Catch.

It was the largest turnout ever for the Champaign tournament (19 players from nine states), and arguably boasted the toughest competition (1995 was close with Mark Weary, Rob Parkins and Chicago Bob). Even so, the man previously known as "The Sandbagger" showed he could compete with, and *beat*, the best.

The wind started out at a brisk 8-10 mph at 9:00 am and remained fairly constant until the last event, MTA, when it died down a bit. Accuracy was the first event and Aaron Kaminski (Hazelwood, Missouri) threw way better than anyone for an unbelievable 38.

Australian Round in the wind was won by Mike Dickson (North Canton, Ohio) with 50 points. A highlight of this event was nine year-old Eric Brazelton (Oakwood, Illinois), competing for the first time as a non-novice, who took 7th place with a Chet Snouffer plywood Seabreeze III.

I had the advantage of going in one of the later Endurance rounds and knew I had to beat Mike Dickson's 24. I made about 37 deliberate throws with my Darnell Nylon Stubby and caught 33 of them. Billy Brazelton (Eagan, Minnesota) stole second with 25, using an ABS Darnell Accuracy boom.

During the lunchbreak I tallied the placing points and at halftime I was on top with a sizeable lead with Mike Dickson, Mike Gabriel (Evanston, Illinois) and Jason Smucker next in line.

The winds puffed a little harder for Fast Catch with gusts up to 13 mph. Dan Hellenberg (Milwaukee, Wisconsin) threw down the gauntlet early with a 39.53 in the first round using a Georgi Dimantchev boom. But for the second time this season Mike Gabriel blew everyone away in windy Fast Catch with his 28.24, using a heavily weighted ABS Stubby by Eric Darnell.

Trick Catch warm-up felt more than a little like MTA for most people. After we caught our breaths, Mike Gabriel came out way on top with 44. One of the most memorable moments of the entire day, though, was Bill Rusky's (Hillsdale, Michigan) only point-scoring catch- a sliding foot catch on his last throw. It was the only foot catch of the day.

The last event was MTA, and by the 4th round, the winds had lessened to about 7mph. There were two ties in this event. Jason Smucker and Aaron Burke (Batavia, Illinois) shared first place with 24.50.

Spike Frazier (St. Charles, Missouri) organized some team events while I tabulated the final rankings. Four teams played two events- Position and Relay. The "American Young Guns" Billy Brazelton (18), Jimmy Brazelton (16), Aaron Kaminski (17) and Greg Schuh (14; Murphysboro, Illinois) swept both events.

By the end of the team events it was getting dark so we adjourned to Garcia's Flying Tomato pizza place for dinner and awards presentation. Following the tradition started at the 3rd Annual Illinois Open, everyone received a boomerang-shaped medal. This year's awards were supplied by Kendall Davis. Thanks again Kendall!

The morning after, several of the stragglers threw some booms until only Mike Gabriel, Eric Brazelton and I were left. We played Hackuracy in 9-18 mph winds and suffered some pretty serious welts. We finally decided we had had enough punishment and headed to the University of Illinois indoor track facility. Being a holiday, we had the place pretty much to ourselves. We threw MTA and Fast Catch, played GLORP, Hackuracy, Accuracy and Sprinklerhead. During Sprinkler head we had a TRIPLE Spinklerhead where THREE people had a foot on the same eight inch bullseye when they caught their booms. Despite the sore toes and ankles, we all agreed this was the most fun we had all weekend. Next year, we'll have the whole tournament indoors! That (continued on next page)

2nd Annual Outer Banks Tournament

Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina September 12-13, 1998

Kitty Hawk Kites hosted the 2nd Annual Outer Banks USBA Boomerang Tournament on Sept 12th and 13th at First Flight Middle School. 13 boomophiles contested USBA events on Saturday the 12th. Free demos and lessons for the public, along with GLORP on Sunday the 13th made a perfect finish to an awesome event.

Wind conditions were like a bowl of strawberries waiting to be dipped into dark, melted chocolate: sweet and tempting. The beautiful panoramic views of the Outer Banks, great organization and publicity by Kitty Hawk Kites' fine folks (namely the wonderful and illustrious Bobbie Servant and the charming, multi-talented and all around RADish Annie Thompson), an eclectic mix of boom throwers, the international scoring system, a huge night throwing session on the sand dunes at Jockey's Ridge, Sunday's shred-fest for the public, and the great weather conditions created, by far, the most fun tournament of the year.

MTA was the first of the USBA events on Saturday and the scores were huge!! The lowest score recorded was over 20 seconds. 5 scores were over 30 seconds, including Steve "The Cookie Monster" Cook's second throw of 38:59 sec.; it was good enough for 3rd place. Not to be out done, Ray Laurent stepped into the 50m circle and launched his #2 throw. His studly physique and precise throwing ability produced a 40:02 sec flight and secure catch which earned him 2nd place honors. Then there was Scott Barrett. The overall co-champion of the Emmaus night tournament was sitting on a 26 when he stepped up for throw #4. For 43 and 1 tenth seconds Mr. Barrett mercilessly defied gravity with his home made, birch wood MTA!! With a fine, casual catch, he claimed top honors.

Aussie Round winds felt like world-record conditions; although Moleman's record was never really challenged, some fine scores were recorded. Of note: neophyte boomer

Dave Hogue, in his first ever tournament threw a 40 meter boom and caught it in the 6 point zone for a 4-4-6!!! Veteran romancers of the bullseye Mike Forrester and Jim Jordan endlessly pummeled the bull with 50 meter throws. Mike was ahead going into the final throw, but only managed a 6-4-1 eleven pointer. Jim, trying to recover from a 4-4-2 ten pointer on his 3rd throw needed to hit a perfect 20 to pass-up Mike. Jim was less than 2 meters short of perfection with a 6-4-8 eighteen pointer securing 2nd place with 77 points, just one point shy of Mike's conspicuously awesome 78!!! John Köehler, took 4th with a 64; Cookie Monster was 3rd with 68.

Fast-Catch scores reflected a small time period of higher winds. John Köehler ripped into the lead with a 27:62 sec in first round. Tim Maultsby, abandoning his "five throws, five booms" theory of fast catch, shredded his way through a 32:35 sec, best first round in his circle, clinic on big wind fast catch. Notable round two improvements included Scott Barrett's 20 second reduction from 50:16 to 29.46 (good enough for 3rd) and of course Mike Forrester's 3 1/2 second improvement from 29:10 to a winning 25:65!!!

Trick Catch produced exciting catches and good scores. Callie Laurent and Dave Hogue both smoothly ended the flights of their booms with casual eagle catches. Jimbo Nieberding not only hit his one-hand behind the back catch, but flawlessly executed the right-hand clean + tunnel catch doubling set. Dave Barrett missed a few easier ones, but hit all the harder ones when it counted to tie Stevie K's 87 for top score. Notably, Mike Forrester's 79 and Scott Barrett's 78 pushed John Köehler's fine performance of 74 all the way down to 5th, his lowest finish all day long!!

Unfortunately, Callie Laurent had a huge wind shift on her first Accuracy throw and went holistic. Surprising nobody, she rallied back and peppered the bullseye to score a 29. Showing no shame, husband Ray hit a perfect 10 on his last throw to top his wife, edge out Mike Forrester, and tie Timmy Maultsby with a 33. 3rd place honors were awarded to Köehler for his 34 point performance. Steve Kavanaugh's 38 point performance was holding up well until Josh Nesemeier's round. Josh, in only his second tournament ever was sitting on 18 points after 3 throws, he took Jim Jordan's simple, yet effective advice and hit a couple of bulls to close out his excellent Accuracy round and tie Stevie K.

In a huge performance, Tim Maultsby shrieked, screamed and grunted all the way through his 47 catches in 5 minutes to tie with the Cookie Monster for 3rd place in Endurance. As an exciting finish to the day Scott Barrett, with the help of his brother Dave, squeaked his way into 3rd place overall, just edging out Mike Forrester by 1/2 of a placing point. (Remember, points are bad in the international scoring system: one point for first, two for second and so on.) Scottie's 43 catches in the final event couldn't beat Mike's 44, seeming to set up a tie for 3rd overall. But, brother Dave was kind enough to tie Mike giving him the fatal extra 1/2 placing point.

At the same time, Köehler and Kavanaugh, battled for the overall championship. It turns out that Stevie had an advantage by one placing point, 17 to 18. Köehler had his own advantage by throwing his round after Stevie's. Mr. Kavanaugh dropped none of his 57 throws, but he knew he couldn't close the door on the 1991 World Champ and former world record holder of this coveted event. Shredding with all his skill, charm and vigor, Köehler never missed an opportunity to catch. At 3 minutes gone, he had 36, a perfect pace for 60!!! But wait, they just called him short on one throw, then another!!! Making the appropriate wind direction adjustments John kept his pace and never looked back. With his awesome performance of 58 catches Köehler just aced out Stevie K.'s 57 for 1st place in Endurance and a tie for 1st overall!!!

cling over the field at one point, and I didn't think it was a fluke that Nobu's Jonas left the field before falling. . . three minutes later.

There is also the phenomenon of *ridge lift*. Over here in the East we have folded mountains as opposed to the pushed-up peaks of the Rockies. When wind hits a folded mountain, it bounces straight up. Sailplanes can fly for hours following the edges of the folded mountains; the world record sailplane time aloft was set (I think) in Pennsylvania. Standing at the crest of an appalachian ridge and facing a stiff breeze, even a triblader will hang like an MTA.

merang Fevers throughout; Paul Gustafson's KUA-best 54.88 in MTA followed closely by Stevie K's 52.97; Gaston Jacques great MTA catch in MTA "1" (one throw, no practice); Steve's smooth 93 in Trick Catch and dropfree personal best 66 in Endurance; Eric Darnell's 81 in Aussie Round with his boomerangs clearing the ground and missing the trees by a combined total distance of about 10 feet for 5 throws; Moleman's 59 in Endurance, as it was getting dark quickly, to end the day. Along with MTA 1, we tested Relay Trial, an individual event based on the Team Relay event contested at the World Championships. For a first time event, it ran quickly and there was the same adrenaline rush and esprit de corps that exists in the Team event. Times for two relay legs were combined, just like team play. Hopefully other TD's will try this fun event next year.

Afterwards, there were dinner, campfire, and award festivities at the Flynn residence. On Sunday, we aborted the attempt for the Consecutive Catching record. Instead, Steve C, Steve K, John F, and Moleman went down to the field to rescue Cookie's tree-bound MTA and played an impromptu game of GLORP, won (surprise!) by the itinerant GLORP-master, Steve Kavanaugh.
