Burlington Competition #1

On July 29th, 15 throwers from New England, New York, and Canada assembled for the first annual Burlington, Vermont, Boomerang Tournament. The competition was held at Fort Ethan Allen Park, part of a former military base from the early 1900's. An old bandstand located on the edge of the park made for a picturesque backdrop and served as competition headquarters.

The competition started at 10:00 am with Accuracy. In winds varying in both speed and direction, Adam Ruhf placed first with a score of 38. Second place, with a score of 31, was a tie between John Flynn and newcomer Justin Brown of Massachusetts. The varying winds continued for the next events, Fast Catch and Endurance. Once again, Adam placed first in Fast Catch with a score of 24.37. John Flynn placed second again with a time of 29.01. The trend continued in Endurance with Adam placing first with 49 catches and John placing second with 41 catches.

After a break for lunch, the competition continued with Trick Catch/Doubling. Adam continued his dominance, missing only the doubling foot catch (just barely), for a score of 90. And once more, John Flynn was right behind, placing second with a score of 83. Going into Australian Round, storm clouds threatened to rain on the competition. John Flynn placed first with a score of 85. Stephane Marguerite placed second and set a new Canadian record with a score of 81. A steady rain fell on Adam and the last group of throwers, with Adam scoring 67 points.

Going into MTA, the final event, the rain had stopped and Adam ' was in first place overall with John trailing by only half a point. With combined throws totaling 123.57 seconds, Flynnie placed first in MTA and won the overall competition. Justin Brown placed second in MTA with a total of 111.52 seconds and the longest single throw of the event at 49.34 seconds. Adam took third place in MTA with 108.30 seconds.

Press releases had been sent out to the local newspapers and television stations and the competition received some good media coverage. A photographer and a reporter for the Burlington Free press arrived mid-morning and stayed for two hours, chatting with competitors and taking pictures. The Sunday edition of the paper featured a prominent article with a large 7" x 7" color photo of Paul Sprague making a two handed under the leg catch with a two-bladed boomerang. The article also included pictures of Adam Ruhf and Eric Darnell, with interviews with Eric and John Flynn. Also featured was a prominent note referring people to the USBA web site for further information about boomerangs and the USBA.





Stunned, the editor contacted a high volume dealer named Tony Bond to get a second opinion about this claim. Sure enough, such a law does exist! However. the new law only applies to a few culturally significant artifacts and Aboriginal manufactured items that have a retail value of more than \$10,000. Gary Broadbent (who has thousands of Aboriginal artifacts) is the only one who has to worry about the new law.



Sensodyne Toothpaste purchased a large number of Aboriginal and strip laminated boomerangs in January for a commercial that required a boomerang in flight. The boomerang that was used in the commercial flies with a range of 40 feet and at a constant height of 6 feet. For those of you who live in Canada and the Northern USA, you can see this commercial right now on Canadian TV. Look on week nights between 9 PM and midnight.

The Triglav is the most recognizable national symbol of Slovenia because it is the highest mountain in Slovenia and part of the national flag. It is said, that each Slovenian should go to the top (2864 m) at least once in his/her life. The other symbols are Olympic circles. Beside that there is written "Bumerang Triglav" at the top of the postmark and "15. 09. 2000" (opening day of OG) and "Ljubljana" with zip code of Main Post Office. The letter-stamp will be in use only at main post office in capital of Slovenia - Ljubljana on the first day of the Games Zoran will send anybody a letter with Slovenian Olympic stamps and stamped with the special edition letter stamp on Sept. 15. 2000. Toss Across America at the BSA Western Regional Camporee - Fort Lewis, Tacoma, Washington on May 20, 2000

The BSA TAA was an amazing experience. First, special thanks to Lynol Amero for getting boomerangs into this BSA event. He placed TAA posters at key spots for the cub and the boy scouts, then helped teach and answer questions all day long!

Betsylew put together a special flyer which the BSA inserted into all the kids packets. The flyer incorporated our key elements what the TAA is, the science, history and sport of boomerangs, and sported the USBA logo plus the Michael Gel leaping under the leg catch graphic.

Thanks next to Seattle throwers Will Herlan and Peter Caliandro who worked with the boys much of the day, and to Doug Du-Fresne, who came up from Portland and helped all day.

When Will and I arrived in the early morning to set up, conditions were cool and cloudy, with variable and shifty winds The wind grew over the course of the day into the low teens by afternoon.

The madness began at the first throw - we completed one formal demonstration before the sheer volume of enthusiastic Cub Scouts wanting to be taught to throw overwhelmed us. At one point all six of us were teaching changing groups of 15 - 20 boys each! As soon as one group would get a few throws and some information about boomerangs, the next troop or collection of individual boys would take their places.We have no idea of the actual total number of boys and adults who participated, just that there was a non-stop stream with many more watching over the course of the day.

Doug and I stopped teaching a bit after 11:00 and did demo throwing. At about 12:30 we packed up and headed over to the Boy Scout area. That field was smaller and harder - except for the swampy parts. We spent the next few hours throwing and teaching hundreds of older boys.

Betwil brought boomerangs for sale, as did Doug (Outback). All the beginner and some of the intermediate models went. Along with beginner models and blanks sold by Lynol, about 90 boomerangs went home to new throwers.

Toss Highlights were legion, but to share a few: The sheer volume and enthusiasm with which boomerangs were received by the boys, parents and Scout Leaders; A 3 minute plus MTA throw with a catch by Betsylew; Great demo performances by Doug, Betsylew and Will; Will Gix setting a teaching record for number of successful returns by newbies under age 10 ; Will Herlan keeping an entire troop of Cub Scouts listening for more than 5 minutes straight; and the flood of boomerangs that leapt simultaneously into the air when the Boy Scouts discovered the entire beginner/intermediate boomerang bag full of booms!

We were also treated to the sounds of the Armed Forces day celebration - marching band, booming tanks and howitzers, plus views of military helicopters and a C-17 aircraft dropping paratroopers at low altitude.

What a Toss!




"Honest, I'm with the grounds crew!" An illegal throw... on the field of the Olympic Stadium in Sydney.

cushy apartment we were evicted in the morning when the manager walked in to find the place in utter chaos. Beer bottles were strewn about the place, dirty dishes were all over the kitchen, and Oli was sprawled out on the living room floor. In a surprisingly polite voice, he informed us that he had tenants coming and he needed us out... in thirty minutes! What we had proudly referred to as our feral den, he reckoned needed some controlling.

We moved into Justine's. In their groovy little beach pad, surrounded by rainforest, overlooking the South Pacific, we found our tube. We learned to surf with Beau and boogie boarded in the incredible blue waves of the South Pacific. We boomed the beach each sunset. We climbed the cliffs and hiked the rainforest. Each night we would watch Oli's videos of our day's with a thirty-pack of VB and our own live soundtrack of bongo drums and didgeridoos, which we practiced daily and were quickly mastering' even the difficult technique of circular breathing. For four perfect days, we found boomerang Valhalla. Time stood still.

The Return

Then it was over. A frantic midnight drive back to Melbourne, dodging kangaroos on the highway

and hurriedly packing bags for the return flight. Two days later, while sitting on a jet airliner bound for LA, I reflected back on the previous month and a thought that had been dancing around at the edge of my consciousness began to drift to the forefront. I had been wrestling with a concept ever since Zip and I had picked up a

book of Aboriginal legends and stories at the beginning of our trip. The Aborigines believe that from dreamtime, you are born and upon death, you return to it. You spend your life slipping in and out of various stages of this dreamtime state.

It is a far different concept of life and reality than our Western way of thinking, where you need to "Take a pill," and "Get a grip" on reality. But, contrary to our rational, analytical thinking, reality is a fluid, indefinable concept. When we are embroiled in life the highs and the lows of it, we aren't even aware that time is passing. When moments are past, we can hardly be certain that they ever existed. The thought that had been bothering me, a nagging frustration with the Aborigines for their inability to

> deal with reality^{*} was beginning to lose credibility.


Back on that New Year's eve when Zippy and I had toasted the new Millennium, I thought February would never come. When we spent that first Australian night on a tram surrounded by giggling bachelorettes, I could not imagine that it would end. Now,

dered if any of it had been real. For one short month, I had managed to leave my reality behind and was now preparing to return to it. But was this the end of the dreamtime? In a week, the high school volleyball team that I coach would begin a very promising season with a skillful group of returning players, each involved in their own dreamtime period called their senior year. And my five-month old son would soon be entering his crawling stage. Then there would be first words, first steps, first day of school' and one day he would be standing on that stage at the end of his own senior year dreamtime. There were plans and business deals and details to list on papers that say "Today's things to do." And some day I would look back on all of it and wonder if it was a dream.

No, it wasn't the end of dreamtime; it was just the end of one dream and the beginning of another. I was beginning to understand what the Aborigines meant, how they look at life, because, for one month, while on a walk-about, I had experienced my own dreamtime^{*} a wonderful little adventure with wonderful friends^{*} the dream called The World Boomerang Cup 2000^{*} in Australia, the land down under!

UMass Team Tournament

I went to Larry Ruhf's National Team Tournament at Umass Amherst on Saturday, 15 July. What a treat! If you didn't make it, I'm really sorry you weren't there.

I don't want to try to give a sports report on the events per se, 'cause I'll get it wrong, and hopefully someone else will do it better. I hope Larry or someone will post participants, results and a summary, like Tony's excellent summary of his recent tournament in Indiana. Instead I just want to give some of my own impressions that I came away with as a newcomer to the sport and to tournaments.

I live in Albany NY and have been throwing for about a year, though not often enough. Until Saturday I never met another thrower (except on rang-list), never saw anyone throw who knew what they were doing, never had any help on my technique (or lack thereof).

I met all kinds of folks who I know from rang-list, others who aren't and various legends of the sport. People came from Ohio, Indiana and Montreal to name just a few. It was great to meet all these folks. I was especially impressed with how uniformly friendly, welcoming and helpful the people in this sport are. From the legends to the other novices, everyone was great. I won't name everyone I met, talked to and threw with, because I'm sure I'd leave someone out.

I was struck by the variety of people in the sport... young, old, athletic and not so, hot-shots, softspoken, techies, artistic types, etc, etc. You might think boomerangs would appeal to a certain type of person, but you sure couldn't tell it from this group. Except there were very few women ... unfortunately booms seem to be mostly a guy thing.

When I got there, people were warming up and the sky was full of whizzing booms, tri-bladers, twobladers, four-bladers, MTAs! What a sight!

The people who know what they're doing really throw! Lots of force and lots of spin. I realize that the throw I've been using is really wimpy compared to the olympian blasts I saw on Saturday, even in practice. I have a lot of work to do!

I've always preferred the twobladers (i.e. real boomerangs). But I can see that for most competition events the tri-bladers are the thing to use. And with the hot throws these guys do, the tri-bladers go as far and are as dramatic as any twoblader I could hope to throw.

While my consistency is nonexistent, I learned that I'm not doing anything particularly wrong with my throw. Sometimes I throw too low, or too high, or too much into or off the wind, or too much or not enough layover but mostly it's a matter of putting everything together on a regular basis. The biggest fault in my technique is lack of steps, or run-up before the throw. I've always just stood there and thrown, but I can see that if I want more power, a run-up is critical. Either this point is downplayed in the various throwing instructions I've read, or I wasn't paying close enough attention.

I expected to be a spectator, or maybe participate in some novice events, but Larry insisted everyone be part of the show. He assigned everyone to teams, mixing up the pros, intermediates and klutzes evenly. Our team captain was Barnaby Ruhe. The other stars on our team were Stephane Marguerite of WallaB in Montreal and the charming Chantal. These three rarely missed anything they tried. Events included accuracy, position, Aussie round, suicide trick catch, MTA and they were starting super catch when I had to leave a little after 5:00.

When I didn't have suitable booms, my teammates fixed me up

with the right ones from their own collections. And Barnaby tried to whip my technique into competitive shape, though he would have needed a few more weeks or months to make any difference.

I've always thought that boomerangs are pretty magical. Well it's even more so with MTA's. I'd never seen one other than pictures and never seen one thrown. They are just amazing, like they're just nailed to the sky and won't come down. Tony Brazelton, Gregg Snouffer, Eric Darnell, Adam, Alex and others all had amazing flights in the 30 and 40 sec. range despite squirrelly wind. A swamp in the far corner of the field ate a few MTA's. It had a special taste for the exotic and expensive ones. Barnaby offered to sell me a birch MTA he'd made himself. I snatched it up in a heartbeat. Someone counseled not to get too involved with MTA though "'cause it's a heart breaker" I can see why.

Trick catch suicide also blew me away. There was a core group that remained making catch after catch without being eliminated. Staying in for eight rounds is impressive. Staying in for fourteen is hard for me to believe, even when I was there to see it. They'd throw, catch and they'd all still be in!

There were lots of other thrills and great moments...too many to recount. I hope we'll get posts of accounts from others who were there whose perspective will be vastly different from mine.

When I left, my arm felt like it would fall off. I've never thrown more than an hour or two at a time before.

And, oh yeah, it rained off and on all day ... nobody cared. At least the torrential stuff I drove through on the way home held off until the end.

Thanks to Larry for putting it together and to everyone who attended and made it such a great event!

A Beginner's View Of Twin Peaks

The Long Distance, Team Gel, and USBA events started with a safety briefing, so to begin, I thought it would be fitting to start this report with one: Wear something over your eyes, preferably safety glasses. You've only got 2 eyes for your whole life. Catching is hard enough, trying to catch with one eye has got to be nearly impossible.

Also that it would be very very helpful if I could get a throwing session in prior to the tournament, even if just an hour and a half or so and that a bunch of Long Distance throwers would be at his house Friday before the tournament and I was invited. I took him up on the invitation and I'm sure happy I did.

Dan and Kelly Neelands house - Friday June 23rd When I got to Dan and Kelly Neeland's house everyone was kibitzing on the third floor so I went up to inspect some of Dan's collection and got introduced to everyone (I can't believe the folks I met! - John and Andy Cross, Erik Fields, Chris Cotter - I'm was in boom heaven). After a tour of the shop we headed out to the field next to Dan and Kelly's house for some tossing. I was throwing a trifly I had carved up for Trick Catch. Right off the bat Erik says, cool boom, but you won't make range and he gives me advice regarding twisting, coins, and placement. Then Don Monroe (Tucson Don) showed up and we head off to the field. First thing on the field Dan gave the safety briefing and then the throwing began. Dan showed me 2 booms and said to give them a try. I did and I needed a lot of instruction, which I got from everyone, along with tons of encouragement. I'm not sure how long we throw, but at the end I was bushed. At least I'd managed to get a few booms back over the line, so I was happy.

Saturday, June 24 - Twin Peaks Begins with Long Distance and Team Gel Long Distance: Everyone from Friday's practice session showed up on Saturday for Long Distance. Also joining us were Sponge (Thornton Alberg), T.W. Smith, boomsmith from Eugene Oregon, and "The Twins", 14 year old Daniel and Richard Bower. Prior to any throwing we got the safety briefing, set up the line, then the warm up throwing. It was misting hard and the winds was light and variable. My first few tosses were okay. We warmed up for a couple hours then got instructions on range finding, divided up into groups based on expected distance and experience, then into the field to range check or to the line to line check or to throw. This was serious work, pay attention, do it right. Through the whole warm up time and during the formal throwing folks were exchanging throwing and tuning advice. As far as I could tell, no one cared who threw the furthest. Everyone was pulling for the thrower to get personal bests and doing their jobs so the personal bests could be measured fairly and accurately.

The highlights, as I remember them: Everyone had a tough time getting a full return. Erik Fields threw the longest with 121m. 14 year old Richard Bower threw an amazing 96 m on his first day of LD (watch out world). I threw 73 m and was happy with that. The winds were so light and variable that during one throw we moved the line 180 degrees, then back. This caused the range checkers to do a little grumbling, but everyone accepted that this was the thrower's right, which I though was a cool way to run an event. At least half the throwers got personal bests. Everyone, especially me, had a great time. Many of the beginners (including me), who didn't own LD booms prior to the event got booms from Dan Neelands - Thanks Dan!

Team Gel Events: What can I say? It was great fun. Super Catch was great, John Cross threw the MTA and still did 3 fast catches - amazing considering everyone else on his team only got 2 catches. Tons of gratuitous flopping during Whoa Nelly. During Hackuracy I saw a boom get hacked once and whack 2 others for a score of 3, the hard way to get 3. To finish up we visited the trophy pile, where everyone got to pull a boom. I'm not sure, but so many booms were added to the pile that I think the pile had more booms on it after everyone pulled than when they started.

Sunday, June 25th, USBA Tournament: I have to confess that I'm a bad reporter. There were multiple circles participating at the same time, and I can only report what was happening at my circle. Overall everyone seemed interested in having fun and sharing our sport.

MTA: The highlight of the session had to be Stevie Kavanaugh foot catching a Jonas. What showmanship! Later I saw Andy Cross agree to repair that boom as long as he could throw it at tournaments. Stevie agreed, but said if they both wanted it they would have to fight - as best I could tell the fight would go something like, "You take it.", "No, you take it." until someone got so horse they couldn't say no and would have to throw it.

Accuracy: Everything from an E-rang to a Fast Catch with lots of drag was tossed during this event. It was a ton of fun to throw simultaneously with another thrower. I think I was the only one to get a rethrow when my boom whacked my partner. I felt lucky it wasn't me who got whacked; once you throw that boom it is really tempting to stand like a stump and watch it fly.

Fast Catch: I was on the circle with Stevie, Doug Dufrense, Betsy-Lew Gix, Janet Fulrath, and Don Monroe. I stood in awe watching these throwers. Unlike me, they all stood in one place and the boom came back to them, I got an aerobic workout. I have no idea who threw fastest. I also saw a thrower get hit in the sun glasses hard enough to scratch the glass so bad she couldn't see to throw. Yeah- back to my safety glasses pitch.

Endurance: I thought my heart was going to jump out of my body and was glad the event wasn't longer. Doug DuFresne moved to where I should be throwing and yelled "throw at me!" to help me. But even more impressive was the encouragement shouted into the circle by all the top throwers including things like "stay strong" and "turn left". This wasn't just to the Novices and Sport throwers, but also to each other. Again, more about seeing everyone do well and less about competing.

everyone do well and less about competing. Trick Catch: The wind was blowing - I got 1 catch. I was amazed to see Doug DuFresne throwing modified Tribladers. These aren't TriFly sized booms, these are big wooden 3 bladed booms. Doug probably got the highest score at our circle. When my doubler set didn't make range, Will Herlan loaned me his beloved set - how cool!

Aussie Round: What a great way to end the tournament. I don't think I had more than 5 throws left in me. I honestly didn't have a clue who got the highest score even though we all threw from the same circle (Thanks to Will Herlan, it was Doug DuFresne with 56). The 3 throwers I remembered most were Peter Caliandro throwing a Wicked Stealth, T.W. Smith throwing a Grebe (flew like a cross between a LD and MTA for T.W., I haven't figured out how to make mine do that yet), and Doug DuFresne throwing a Viper.

Prize Pile: Again everyone gets to pull, from lowest scoring Novice to highest scoring Open thrower. Then all the spectators get to pull, then around again. That pile was huge!

GLORP: Stevie Kavanaugh (Mr. GLORP) got beat by London Hoff. Stevie ran out and gave London a hug of congratulations. The perfect ending to this tournament.
