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NATIONALS EXPOSITION 2002

The USBA and Tournament Director Betsylew Miale-Gix is pleased to announce that The 2002 USBA National Exposition will take place in the Seattle, Washington area from June 6 - 9, 2002.

The kickoff event on June 6, 2002 will take place at Marymoor Park in Redmond, Washington and will feature skill building and boomerang construction, design and decoration workshops. Local and National boomerang throwers and craftsman will be on hand.

The main events will take place on June 7 - 9 at Mountain Meadows Farm in North Bend, Washington. This beautiful site features a manicured grass polo field large enough for distance, located in a picturesque small town at the base of Mount Si.

Further details about accommodations, camping and transportation will be provided.

Tentative Schedule of Events:

June 7, 2002 - USBA Individual Core Event Championships. Open to all throwers. Throwers will be given the option to compete in either the Novice, Open or Sport categories. Events will begin at 9:30 AM.

USBA annual meeting will take place at 8:00 PM. Room location to be announced.

June 8, 2002 - USBA Team Events Session 1. 9 AM - 12 PM. This event will offer everyone an opportunity to participate in team

events regardless of skill level. Teams will be put together blending throwers with different levels of experience to compete in 3 events. Events will include Position, Team Hackey Catch, modified Team Endurance Relay and possibly more as time permits.

USBA Team Events Session 2. 1 PM - 6 PM. This event is geared to those who are intermediate level and above. The USBA boomerang teams will compete as units. Other throwers can either put together 4-6 person teams in advance or form pickup teams on site. A minimum of four WBC team events will be contesting including Endurance Relay, Supercatch, Relay, Australian Round.

Alcohol free Sangria party and special boomerang throw to follow.

USBA Auction and Boomerang Craftsmanship Awards. 8pm. Room location to be announced.

June 9, 2002 - H2H Championship 9 AM - 12 PM. Features the top 8 overall and top 8 in each event from the Sport division of the Core Championship tournament on Friday.

USBA Nationals Distance Tourney. 12:30 PM - 7:30 PM (or dark whichever the throwers decide) For the first time since the mid 1980s, a distance event will be part of the USBA Nationals events - for both those already hooked and folks who have always wanted to try distance.

This will be a terrific event in a beautiful local. Make your travel plans now while the airlines need the passengers!

The USBA will be holding the U.S. Boomerang Team Trials in April, 2002, in Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. The purpose of the Team Trials is to select squad members for the U.S. Boomerang Team, which will travel to Kiel, Germany next July to compete in the 2002 World Boomerang Championship.

Tentative U.S. Trials dates are April 12-14, 2002, Thursday through Sunday. The event will be sponsored by Kitty Hawk Kites, who will provide housing and other assistance. The coaching staff includes head coach Eric Darnell and assistant coaches John Koehler and Barnaby Ruhe.

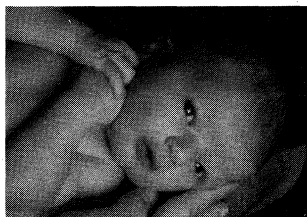
News From The: USA

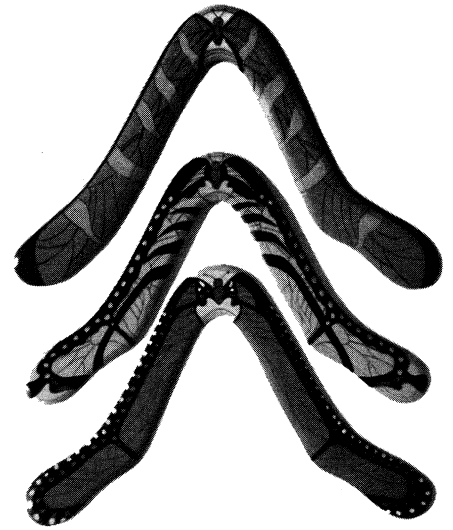
Congratulations to Tony and Tara Brazelton on the birth of son Joey in mid-September. Joey is pictured below at 36 hours and center

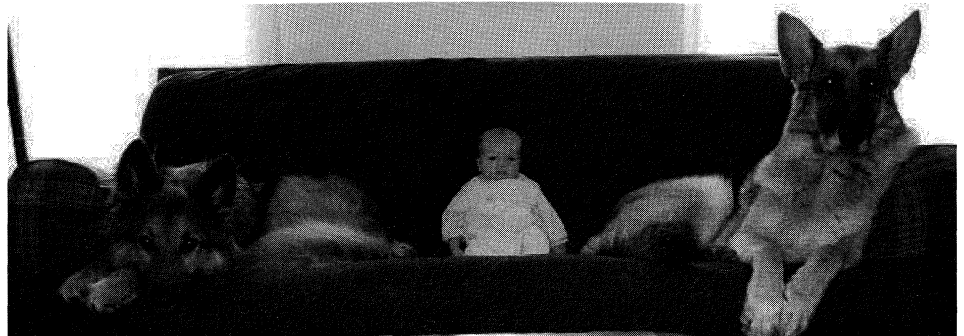

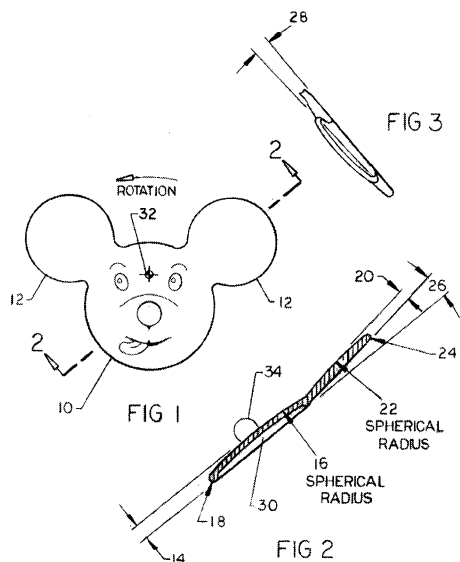

U.S. Patent # 06293879

Congratulations go to Charles D. Moore for being awarded U.S. Patent # 06293879 on 25 September 2001 for a patent depicting a Multi-disk boomerang (looks like a mouse, see drawing above). The abstract for this invention reads: A flying toy of the boomerang type utilizing circular airfoils in the form of disks comprising a main disk with a plurality of control disks affixed to its perimeter at their perimeters, sufficient to provide rigidity and lying in a generally common plane forming a homogeneous one-piece unit. When thrown overhead so as to rotate through the air the combination of disks creates lift throughout 360° of boomerang rotation. The result is a safer, more balanced and stable boomerang that is easy to throw and catch. You can contact the inventor at:

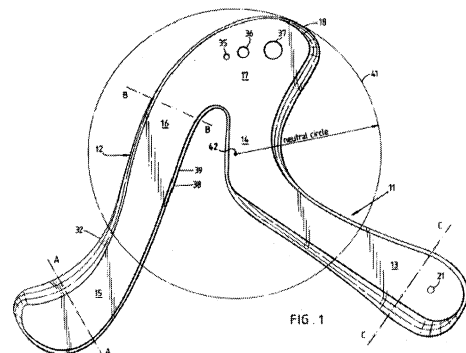

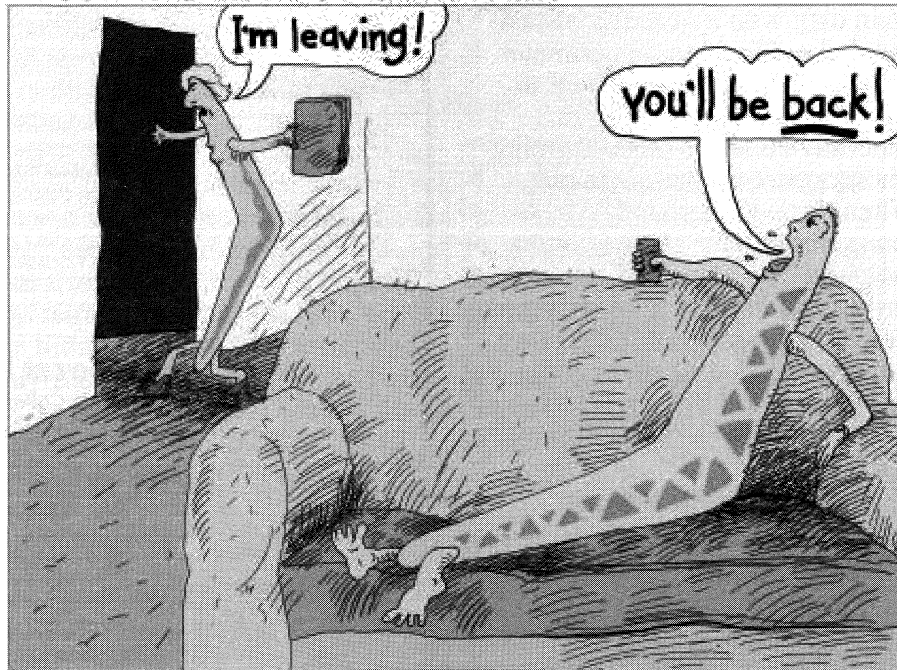


Gerry and the PaceMakers show off their boomerangs in a photo on a music scoresheet from the 60s.

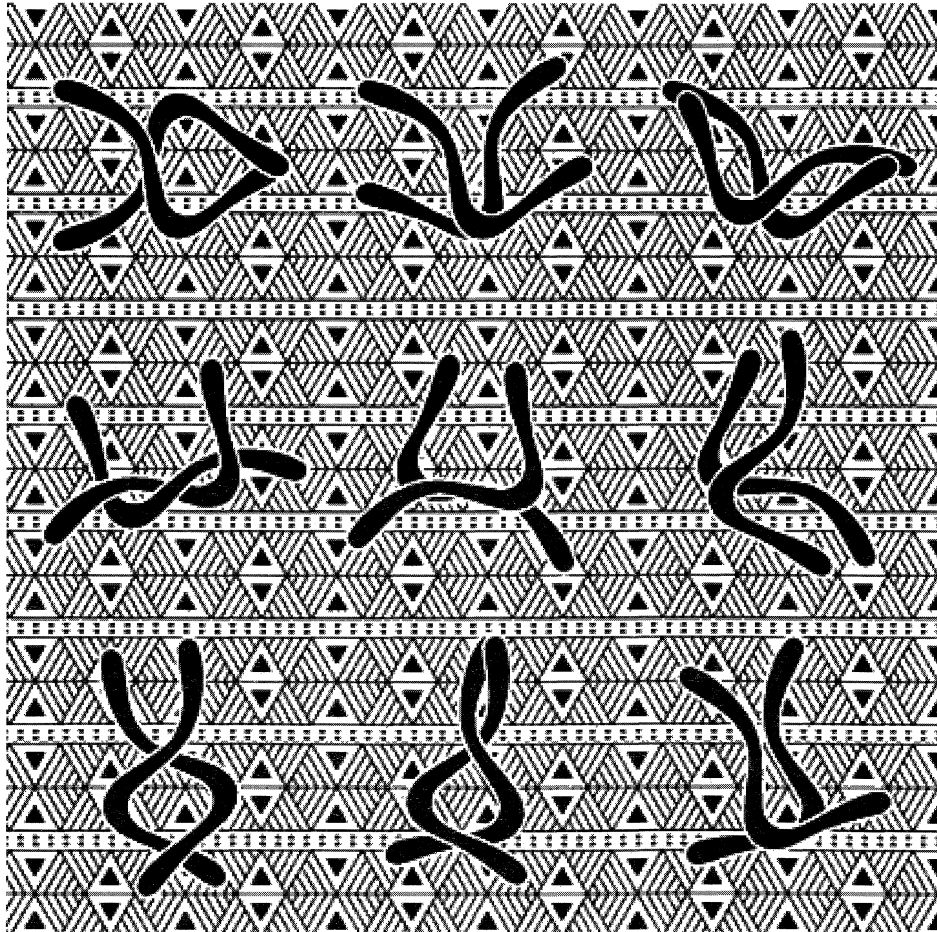

Candidate Statements 2001

President - Gregg Snouffer

My name is Gregg Snouffer and I am running for USBA President. I have been throwing boomerangs since I was 6 years old. I started throwing competitively with the organization that would become the USBA in 1978, when I attended my first Smithsonian Fling in Washington DC on the Polo Fields. Since then I have been involved with the USBA in various ways. Very briefly, I believe we should focus on three very simple avenues that will bring about the growth of our sport, craft and hobby:

1) Re-engage the U.S. boomerang crafters by giving them a product that will entice them to stay involved with the USBA. This involves 2 things. First, an annual national boomerang expo that showcases their work, new ideas in shop layout, boomerang design, technology,... a chance for those with this unique interest to meet up, swap stories and ideas, and to focus attention on their work by providing awards and recognition for their efforts. Secondly, to provide an MHR with a renewed dedication to crafters, with articles and features of interest to them, and which showcase craftsmanship and design stories from the U.S. and around the world. We need to identify an editor who is willing to aggressively pursue photos and articles pertaining to these interests.

2) We need to continue to re-invigorate the sport for those with an interest in competition (as well as those newbies who get exposed to it) by making competitions action packed, fast-paced, challenging, exciting and fun. We should focus our efforts on making competitions friendly to spectators who may come, as well as continue to make it accessible to a tele-

vision market and to aggressively go after sponsorship and media in an effort to bring our product to the national media in some format (ESPN2 or others).

3) To promote our sport, hobby, craft and organization (the USBA) to those out there who haven't been exposed to it yet. This means aggressively and selflessly pursuing sponsorship, television appearances, magazine articles and exciting venues for the sport, art and craft of boomerangs, without jealousy or resentment toward the promotion of any throwers other than ourselves, nor toward the promotion of any aspect of the sport, craft or hobby other than areas in which we are individually interested. Those who run for and hold office in the USBA need to think as promoters for the USBA and for boomerangs over ourselves and the areas in which we hold a particular interest. We need to aggressively pursue promotion in all media for all aspects of our hobby. Let's boot this thing into orbit!

Vice President - Fred Malmburg

Most of you know who I am; "Dr. Fred" has been around a long time, both as a competitor and as a crafter and a theorist. I enjoy these various aspects of boomerangs, and it gives me an unusual over-view of the diversity that is boomerangs. I have been vice president a few years now, and the other Board members and I have some interesting new concepts ready to be introduced in the next year. With your help, I value the opportunity to implement these changes, to keep the US at the forefront of boomerang evolution in all its aspects. If you need to reach the Board on any issue, I am always reachable, and I actively initiate and participate in Board discussions and issues.

Secretary - Betsylew Miale-Gix

This must be the year we finally focus on significant organization building. If elected I will head a Diversified Growth Committee that will involve USBA members both on and off the Board. Our purpose will be to:

1. Re-engage the boomerang crafter hobbyists the USBA has lost touch with over the last few years;
2. Spread knowledge of and information about boomerangs in the general public and encourage participation in our sport at the local level through schools, libraries, scouting groups and others;
3. Encourage development of local boomerang clubs including preparing how to materials and other USBA support. This committee will brainstorm on ideas, develop action plans, budgets and implementation time-lines with project coordinators. I will also continue to coordinate Toss Across America, USBA insurance and perform the other duties of USBA Secretary.

Board Member at Large

Chet Snouffer

In running for the board and not president this year, I think it would be good for the sport to have some fresh perspective up top. It would be nice after the election to perhaps establish some form of succession from Sec to VP to Prexy and set limits of term...maybe 2 years in each position, but not limiting how long a person can serve in different capacities on the board in general. Meanwhile, here are my suggestions for the new year.

1. Moratorium on rules and team selection formats for 2 years. We leave it where it is and spend no

more energy on it. I think the rules need help, but that is the least of our worries. The team selection process I feel very confident of. And again, it's the least of our worries.

2. Promote the heck out of membership through the fliers we did up (FANTASTIC!) and on-line promotions and at demos. We build in some incentives so guys like Gary and I have reason to PROMOTE USBA MEMBERSHIP and not just ourselves when we travel. Some way that there is some benefit to getting others involved.

3. DEVELOP a line of USBA merchandise. A USBA Polo shirt, the USBA T, the USBA travel Bag, patch, window sticker. Sell it on-line by finding a reputable, motivated volunteer to do the store and to stay with it. Their duties would be to stock, sell and to develop further lines of merchandise. This could be a paid position and they could be paid a % of sales. The harder they work, the more they make. It's not a "real job" so don't quit yours, but let's make incentives everywhere for people to produce.

4. Work with companies to market boomerangs and their products. Coordinate with TV, news media, etc...become the official source for boomerang information worldwide. If you are an editor, a director, an attorney in a lawsuit.

5. Grass roots activities. The Toss across is a great Springboard. How about the Vernal Equinox Toss? The Mid-Winter Fest? If we had 3 or 4 annual events that are NOT COMPETITION, but chances to throw and learn and they are coordinated just like TAA?

Adam Ruhf

My experience in this sport should speak for itself, I have been here

as long as anyone. In addition to that, however, I have also a background in top level higher education, experience in grassroots organizing of various social and political contexts, and a unique sense of the world that could contribute to a team of thinkers.

This is my platform. Bigger, Better, Faster, More. I'm looking to, with the help of other like minded enthusiasts, begin the Boomerang Revolution, where by in the evening light of our crusade, we can all lay pool-side, sipping and reminiscing about 9 hour tournaments and paying our own way.

USBA National EXPO 2001

This year the USBA unveiled a new and expanded Nationals format that had something to offer for almost anyone excited about boomerangs! The three days of throwing featured Individual, Team and Head to Head competitions. There was the design competition, the Junior Individual National Competition, as well as an opportunity to throw rare collectible boomerangs.

The individual competition day was a typical Midwestern day with tricky conditions. Over 50 throwers competed in the individual championship, with 35 competing in the Open division. There was a good mix of established and newer competitors in a well run event which finished in reasonable time. There were some excellent performances as set out below, with no competitor mistake free and running away from the rest of the field.

On Saturday morning the less experienced throwers took center stage, selecting team members for a three event team event which featured Team Position, Fast Catch/Throw, and Relay. The sharing, coaching and fun were contagious as the "pros" and less experienced throwers alike enjoyed the events.

Saturday afternoon saw more serious competitive teams duking it out in a series of three additional events.

Teams included the home town COBRA team, various pickup teams as well as the B-town boys - ringers brought by Adam and Larry Ruhf. Suicide Trick Catch, Australian Round and MTA were contested.

When the dust settled on the team play, it was time to socialize and unwind with collector boomerangs, food and beverages at the Sangria party on the field. Throwers had the opportunity to admire and throw several unusual and rare boomerangs.

Boomerangs by Janetski and Herb Smith were among those available to test drive. This was fun!

Sunday brought the H2H championship featuring the top 8 overall finishers and the top 8 throwers from each event. There were some nota-

ble performances in the somewhat blustery conditions - with John Flynn beating out Adam Ruhf in the Fast Catch final, John Gorski prevailing over Betsylew Miale-Gix in MTA, Steve Cook outdueling Chet Snouffer in Trick Catch, Mark Legg overcame John Flynn in Accuracy.

During the H2H competition, a new event designed to highlight our younger throwers was held called the Junior Nationals. Several aspiring stars of the future competed and Logan Broadbent emerged the champion. Of note, Logan had also qualified for the H2H Australian Round event, so put his youthful energy to good use crossing the field to compete in that event as well.

This was a truly remarkable weekend and the format will in large part be followed again in the Expo 2002 in Seattle in early June 2002.

American Sets Boomerang World Record

New Trick-Catch Record Replaces German Champion's Mark

Steve Kavanaugh set a new world record in Trick Catch this past weekend at a boomerang tournament in Emmaus, PA. Mr. Kavanaugh, of Seattle, Washington, scored 279 points in the internationally recognized Trick Catch event to edge Fridolin Frost's old record of 262 by 17 points. Mr. Frost is a three time World Champion boomerang thrower from Germany.

In the Trick Catch event, competitors must throw a boomerang out 20 meters before making a series of increasingly difficult catches - first 10 catches are made with one boomerang thrown, the last ten with two boomerangs thrown simultaneously. Catches range from one handed to under the leg, behind the back, and with the feet.

Steve Kavanaugh is a Seattle native who graduated from Garfield High School and the Evergreen State College and employed by the Essential Baking Company in Wallingford. He learned to throw boomerangs while attending the Evergreen State College and has been throwing competitively for fourteen years.

I Beat Pete

Tuesday evening July 10, I met with Pete Christy from the Comcast Sportsnet in Philadelphia, for an "I Beat Pete" challenge in boomerang throwing. Pete entertains challenges in various sports in an effort to promote less known sports. Pete contacted me about the possibility of a boomerang contest and I accepted. After some instruction and warm-ups Pete and I did the boomerang challenge. We started with a round of Accuracy because it was like the event shown on Survivor and familiar to Pete. The weather was not cooperating and the winds started to gust making throwing difficult. In addition, we were throwing almost on signal from the cameraman that he was ready. In one of the most pathetic displays of accuracy I have witnessed, Pete managed only 3 points and I ended up with only 11. This was for five throws! We both only managed to get two

boomerangs within 10 meters. It was strange because during warm-ups, Pete and I were getting sixes and eights on almost every throw. I guess that turning on the camera and counting scores had us both nervous. In addition, I left my best accuracy booms at home and we used one of my Running Mon boomerangs with holes drilled in it for windy weather. It wasn't the best choice for accuracy but both Pete and I were doing well with it earlier.

Our other event was Aussie Round. Both Pete and I had settled down and did much better. Pete had become accustomed to throwing an AboSteve "Kookaburra" from my bag and wanted to use it. I figured that we could use what he like best. Pete was at a definite disadvantage here as he had only caught one boomerang in practice. We were getting about 40 meters so we awarded 4 points for distance (we had no spotters) and awarded 4 for a catch plus accuracy points. Pete did a lot of running and managed to catch his last one. I had managed to gain some control and caught 4 of 5 thrown. Final score for the event was 44 to 26 with me winning again. We had considered a round of Fast Catch but gave up due to the wind and amount of time available. Fellow co-worker, Karen Bray, and my wife, Barb, helped by taking photos, keeping score and measuring distances for both events.

While Karen totaled the scores: I tried a few trick catches for the camera. The winds again were not good and I missed the catches. In an effort to end the event with a big bang, I decided to make one last throw with my 33" boomerang and ended up catching it 10 feet from the camera. The catch was good enough for 8 points in accuracy or 16 in Aussie Round.

To cap off the session, Pete awarded me an "I Beat Pete" T-

shirt and I gave him a BVD'Rangs T-shirt. Everyone involved (Pete, Karen, Barb, the camera man and myself) signed two commemorative boomerangs that I made and Pete and I each got one.

The session aired on July 25 around 10:45PM and again on July 27. Pete did a great job of editing, and a better job of making me look good. He patched together the Aussie Round segment to make him look like he was continually running around. He added music (come back baby?) and sandwiched a shot of me making a perfect catch in the middle of all his misses. After showing me receiving the t-shirt, and announcing, "I beat Pete!" on camera, he then ended the session with my throw and catch of the mega boomerang. The final seconds show me making the catch, yelling, "Yes!" then turning to the camera and saying, "That was pretty cool."

The incredible part was immediately after the spot ended. The sports anchors for the show are supposed to read the cards that tell how to challenge Pete. Both of them were laughing so had that they couldn't speak. Finally one managed to gain composure enough to say "Thank you, Dave,

for making Pete run around like that." Pete has called to tell me that the segment is one of the best-received ones this year and that favorable comments keep coming in. Several co-workers saw my TV debut and asked me to teach them to throw a the company picnic. The whole process was a lot of fun.

Santa Barbara LD Comp 2001

On June 21st and 22nd Erik Fields and Budd Jamieson hosted the United States' premier long distance tournament on Storke Field in Santa Barbara, California, sponsored by UCSB Rec-Sports. The event was truly international with throwers from the Switzerland, Canada, and the US. Storke Field is huge, groomed, and has a good sea breeze, it's hard to imagine a better place to throw long distance.

Long distance is more of an event than a competition. It's more about throwing with others and accurately measuring the throws than who throws the farthest. The experienced throwers like Erik Fields, Dan Neelands, Kelly Neelands, and Tibor Horvath usually line judge. This puts them on the line with the throwers. Allowing them to measure the throws, but even more importantly to coach and mentor the beginners. Anyone who showed up on the field without booms was loaned booms from an experienced thrower's kit. A lot of these booms took many hours to build and tune. To me, this represents the giving spirit of the sport. Also, when anyone gets a great throw or personal best, the whole field celebrates, it's a group effort.

Andy Cross, Budd Jamieson, and Tibor Horvath did an awesome job as head spotters. Their job was to find the range of each legal throw. This isn't an easy job, but these guys made it look easy.

Here are the highlights as I remember them. There were other throwers, but I just don't remember how far they threw.

Erik Fields set the new US record at 158. This wasn't a lucky throw,

he had multiple throw in the 150 range. Spotters standing over 150 meters from the line would mutter expletives of awe or sometimes shout them when Erik threw.

Andy Cross first broke the Canadian record by 1 meter, then decided to bury it with a 129 throw! Way to go, Andy! Andy also makes awesome booms, I know because I was throwing one on Sunday.

Don Monroe broke 100 meters. Everyone in the field was whooping and shouting and dancing around - I was on the line with Don and got a hug, as did everyone else on the line. We all initialed Don's boom.

Dan Neelands had many long throws and broke out of the 120 doldrums with a huge 133 meter throw. Again much dancing and whooping.

Kelly Neelands is totally consistent. She had the most returns for the whole tournament. Kelly isn't a power thrower, it's all finesse, and she has it to the max. Kelly has been on the verge of breaking 100 for a couple of years. You should hear the field when she gets up to throw, everyone is holding their breath. We're sure we'll get to see her break 100 - there is going to be one HUGE celebration when she does.

Budd Jamieson had a bunch of long tosses. One was 153 meters, very close to his old US record. Wow.

Craig, a new guy, was throwing a hook and getting in the 80s. The group talked him into throwing a voyager and he upped his personal best to somewhere in the 90s.

Chris Cotter upped his personal best to 111. Chris also got the highest average throw for Sunday and the most returns. He was on.

Dan Harding had an incredible Sunday, he was throwing why out there and got tons of returns. Dan also provided beautiful prize booms painted by his wife.

Tibor Horvath had many huge throws, but had trouble getting returns. His longest throw ended up being 124 meters. Tibor is an awesome thrower and a great head spotter.

Richard deNuccio showed up with a pocket full of booms he had made the previous week. He threw and threw. While the rest of us were sitting down for lunch, Rick stayed on the field throwing and tuning his booms. This guy has stamina!

I broke my old personal best with a 109 throw then got a 123. Both throws caused much dancing, whooping, and hugging.

On Saturday, Karen Dawson had a bunch of throws in the 80s and 90s, then had a fabulous throw of 100. I think she was stunned, the whole field celebrated. She joined the 100 meter club and got the most radical throw of the day for throwing 100 and using a javelin, front leg up in the air throwing style. On Sunday Karen threw 124 in the first round, the boom dropped just 1 meter behind the line. The field knew it was a long throw, but stood there for a few seconds then started jumping around and whooping. I got much harassing about having to throw farther. None of Karen's throws (mine either for that matter) were hers alone. Tibor, Dan, Erik, Kelly, and others were coaching her between throws. This was more of a group effort than an individual effort.

It was the night after the tournament... Saturday night. We had finished the tournament in good time... there were only 14 throwers... then gone to the ocean to film the "Jaws" sequence for the upcoming epic boomerang thriller "The Fifth Throw," starring nearly every boomerang thrower in the United States. Later that evening, after the awards dinner, Tim Maultsby suggested we go out for a dune toss. Us Midwest boys had never been on a dune toss, and decided to go along. But first, we had to make a stop by Kelly's house on the way and got to the dunes after everyone else.

You climb up a giant dune that faces the parking lot and Kitty Hawk Kite Store, but as you crest the dune, you leave the light of the buildings behind and face a sea of darkness and sand, as

scores of smaller dunes stretch across the narrow Cape Hatteras to Pamlico Sound. At night, it is surreal, and what we saw made it even more strange... fireflies... blinking, nodding, spiraling, running, flying fireflies. It was one of the weirdest things I had ever seen. Tim had outfitted a dozen or so throwers with cyalume light stick boomerangs. As we approached we began to make out the people who provided the locomotion for the tiny bugs. After throwing a few times, you wanted to climb up a nearby dune again and just watch them fly, with the rumble of the Atlantic ocean in the distance, the sand-muted sounds of voices and laughter and the dim light of a thousand stars overhead.

Cookie was there... the one companion who had been with Zip and I in Southern Australia, where, on that one magical night, we had thrown lighted booms under the Southern Cross while Aurora Australis glowed eerily overhead, and Adam Ruhf played didgeridoo in the sand on the shore of the Tasman Sea. Cookie knew what magic was, and this was our Eastern U.S. version of it.

I was somewhat dismayed and expressed my concern that Cookie and John Kohler hadn't gotten the word out about this incredible Kitty Hawk tradition. If throwers were aware that they did this each year after the tournament, there would surely be some who would make the journey just for this portion of the weekend!

Later that night came the usual: boomerang throwers at a dance club, shaking sand out of their ears and mixing it up with the locals; their one night out together before the long winter sets in. While I could describe the story that ensued as similar to the hundreds of others that have occurred over the years after different boomerang tournaments, and while you might think that the

story grows old and tired, it never does. Hamburg, St. Louis, Seattle, Corvallis, Geneva, Melbourne, Perth, Ft. Wayne, Hampton, Phoenix, Emmaus, Gaithersburg, Gunnison, Columbus, Ann Arbor, Indianapolis, D.C., Christchurch, Evry, and on and on.... It's a timeless story of airfoils and good times, of friends re-united and celebrating Bernoulli's strange discovery, made over 250 years ago.

A funny thing happened on the way home from the tournament. Sunday morning, while Eric, Barnaby, Kohler, Cookie and Flynnie tested their wings hang gliding in the early morning light, the Midwest boys caught up on a little sleep, and then killed a few spare hours before departure on the sands of Virginia Beach. Aside from the usual stroll down the boardwalk, and nosing through a couple of surf shops, we took a few minutes to jump in the water and frolic in the waves. On our way back up to the car, Rev. Jim noticed that he had dropped his wallet, which he had tucked into his shoe that he was now carrying. We quickly retraced our steps the two hundred or so meters that we had come from the ocean, but to no avail.

As we grabbed a sub at Hero's, we wondered if Jim would be able to board his plane for his return flight to St. Louis without a photo I.D. It was September 9, and we had no idea what would transpire just two days later that would change the nature of air travel forever. So, as Jim checked in at the ticket counter and found that he would be allowed to complete the return leg of his trip by signing an affidavit stating that he was indeed Jim Schramm, Mark and I watched from a distance, while Mark made bad jokes under his breath, like pretending to yell across the airport to Jim, "Osama, hurry up! We'll miss our plane!" I told him not to even THINK about joking like that, while at

the same time subconsciously wondering how many Americans would even get it, given our stereotypically horrible awareness of current events. Who could have known what lay in store just 48 hours later, and the notoriety those events would soon bestow upon one exiled Saudi capitalist-turned-terrorist?

A couple of weeks later, when Jim called me to say that the one person in Virginia Beach who WOULD have turn it in to the police apparently DID find and turn in his wallet, credit cards, money

and all, we nervously laughed at the irony of the whole situation. And we wondered what now would happen to the poor soul who, while traveling, might lose a wallet or purse with their picture I.D. before the return leg of their trip. I'm not sure that a signed affidavit will work anymore. Finally, just a word on the situation that has changed life for all of us. If you frequent the yahoo club "Boomerang Talk," you might have caught a message posted there a few weeks ago. I don't remember who posted it, but in it,

he cleverly alluded to boomerang throwers understanding what the President meant when he urged Americans to get back out and fly. As we head into winter in the Northern Hemisphere, and the winds turn cold, I wonder how much flying we'll do. But one thing keeps me looking forward; spring is coming... and another tournament is being planned... and another boomerang party will follow... and another story will be written. The magic is still there. I think we all know how to fly.
