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



Brother Brian Passes Away

Australian boomerang enthusiast and pioneer, Brother Brian Thomas passed away on Sunday, April 21 of complications associated with a brain tumor.

Brother Brian was a dominant boomerang promoter and competitor, winning over a hundred titles in his 27 years of boomerang competitions. His world record score of 90 out of 100 in the Australian Round event in 1983 stood for over a decade. His accuracy record of 42 out of 50 in 1984 was listed in the Guinness Book of World Records.

He worked to gain recognition for the sport of boomerangs by the Australian government in 1979 and was the coach and captain of the first Australian team in 1981 when the International Boomerang Cup was born.

He was also a teacher and used boomerangs as modern-day parables to teach children lessons about life. He helped produce a boomerang for blind children.

He was a prolific letter-writer, sometimes writing over 300 letters a year, often to people he had never met, often to people he had met only once at a boomerang event.


In the worst case, one of the guys actually threw it side-armed, with predictable results; it went practically straight up and came back down, in the circle. Unfortunately, they counted the throw.



Fun-flys in the face of tragedy

Boom enthusiast Gary Schopp spends the weekend in a Maine hospital after a family tragedy and finds healing

I spent the past week in Portland, Maine. Of course, I did bring boomerangs just in case. Thankfully I had stocked up on fun flys (thanks Kendall), and tri-flies (thanks Vince) so I was able to bring a couple for the nephews and nieces. Would have been a nice trip, but for the niece (13) and nephew (4) were in the hospital and my brother-in-law suddenly dead.

Therefore much of my time was spent at Maine Medical Center.

Maine Medical Center seems to be a pretty nice place. The Children's Hospital on the 6th floor (named after Barbara Bush) appeared exceptional. There was a room setup for teens with foosball, Play Station, and couches, and a younger kids' play room with all kinds of toys. I especially liked the sign on the door of the little kids' room - "Medical procedures prohibited". A sanctuary.

In the core of the 6^{th} floor was an atrium of sorts with sky lights and a large primary color kite sculpture. It is the waiting area for that section. So I see this bright, quiet large space. Hmm. possibilities. Back down to the rental I go to get my bag with the fun flies. If I have to wait, I may as well have a little diversion.

Pop the staples, bend and twist. A weekend in Rock Island at an RV show made it automatic. Yellow magic goes spinning into the space. Justifying it in my head that I'm just getting them tuned to fit in the space of a hospital room, I keep working the bend and twist. Then red, like a flower against the skylights and kites.

A child in a stroller is wheeled into the room, its motor pausing. The near baby smiles. A volunteer enters carrying a board game. She is followed by a teen leading an i.v. rack attached to his arm. Pale and bald, you can tell this kid is a joker. For some reason a picture of a smiling, half-bald man popped into my mind. The boy's attention is split between the game and me. I throw in 'some doubling before I take a break to look in on my reason to be . in Maine.

In the midst of throwing I said "One of these is for you. What's your favorite color?" "Red" was the only word not spoken in pain or sadness or anger that she said to me the entire week.

It's not long before back I'm back to the waiting room. Back to the comforting monotony of catch, snap, watch, catch, snap, watch... My bald audience returns. A few short instructions and we threw for I don't know how long. First just him. Then I show him catches. I even managed to get to the floor for a foot catch. He managed a one handed behind the back despite the tubing. We got them stuck in the a/c vents and the tops of the ficus trees. We threw toward each other, red and vellow looping inside the other's circle. Staff passed through and left with a grin. My dad and brother smiled and shook their heads at their odd son/brother throwing boomerangs in a hospital. One of the janitorial staff - she was at least 60 - tossed a few times with us. We

laughed - when I stood within arm's reach of her, no matter which side, she managed to hit me.

My niece did get down to the atrium the next day. She hasn't been happy to see anybody. Since one of these things is for her, I started tossing in small circles on the other side of the trees. Slowly I worked around the plants keeping my back or side to her. If she thought I was throwing for her, I would have been told to leave. She stole glances from the puzzle she was working on with her grandmother. Grandma was wise enough to not tell her to watch her crazy uncle. Doubling caught her full attention. She mentioned something to grandma about me Juggling brought being silly. another comment and a precious and rare smile.

In the midst of throwing I said "One of these is for you. What's your favorite color?"

"Red" was the only word not spoken in pain or sadness or anger that she said to me the entire week.

This is one of my top boomerang moments. I don't think it will be matched in a long time. At that moment I wished for 200 fun flies and time to teach the volunteers how to show the kids to throw. Everyone on the 6th floor needed that boomerang joy - kids, parents, nurses, doctors, even janitors. Nieces and nephews. Widowed sisters.

The wish didn't come true. Not the only one that week.

Whether you show one, or ten, or ten thousand the magic, it doesn't matter. Just keep on doing it.

One of these days I'll write something not so heartfelt. Like a Harbor Freight Tools has opened in Peoria.





National MTA record set during a crazy weekend

During the Open portion of the weekend, Gregg Snouffer had an 81.44 MTA flight that traveled 20 meters, at most. He followed it up with a 48 second flight and a 28 second flight to round out his 157.68 second score for best three out of five throws to not only win the event, but to set a new U.S. record.

Jason Smucker had a 77.56 second flight, which, combined with his other two best times added up to a total of 138.1 seconds for second place.

At about the same time, Betsy Miale-Gix tossed a SINGLE THROW that was aloft for 149.8 seconds, but which she caught fifty meters out of bounds.

Two days later, during a head to head round, Adam Ruhf threw a 200.17 second flight which he caught several hundred meters away in the middle of a cow field bog. His time, like John Gorski's 17 minute flight a few years ago, was listed as a feat, because it did not take place during a normal MTA event as part of a regular boomerang tournament.







2002 St Louis Gateway Classic More than just pretty booms

The Lovely Ladies of Boomerangs



The ladies in attendance at the annual Gateway Classic on Memorial Day weekend in St Louis got more second looks than the boomerangs. 




Wind indicators just 15 meters apart show two different wind directions at the Gateway Classic '02, resulting in tricky conditions for throwers.


Boomerang legend Rusty Harding defies all odds, making the trip to St Louis to hang with his "Buds"



The Best of Boomerang Cyber Chat

Edited by Billy Brazelton

In this installment of BBCC, we explore the aerodynamics of Colorado Boomerang's Condor Comp. This was one of my very first boomerangs, and I remember that it was my only boomerang that could handle tough winds without modification. The reason for the Condor's wind-resistance may not be as simple as you think, however.

The **Boomerang Man Rich Harrison** recounts how the famous Condor grooves came to be: All too often, a maker makes such a clean, smooth rang that it does tend to "blow past" or never come down. Anyone who has a Jim Mayfield Condor Comp will see that Jim made a groove on the bottom of the wing. He liked clean rangs. Certainly, in the retail store, such rangs look good; he did not care for my suggestion of a blunt spot...thus he did the groove into the middle, underside of the Condor wings.

Thomas Carter attempts to explain the grooves aerodynamically: Maybe one of our AE's can help us out here. But I recall from my days of yore that undercutting a wing, as was done on the Condor Comp, would increase the wings' lift at low speed at the price of drag, much like the flaps on the leading/trailing edges of an aircraft during takeoff/landing. And a second advantage to the way Jim did it would be to lighten the overall weight of the boom, and by adding the weights to the endpoints, increase its spin speed/retention. And now that I've said that, the first point, increasing lift as speed drops, is just what you would want to get a boom to "put on its brakes".

Colorado Boomerangs owner **Richard Pollock-Nelson** tries to create an aura of mystery around the Condor: The grooves in the Condor Comp were designed to add drag. I use it as a great wind boom and have added holes and tape in real strong wind. Does it increase lift, make it lighter..and some of the other speculations? Maybe...

Fred Malmberg gives us a clear idea of how grooves could increase lift: In a standard "semi-crude" boom airfoil, in which the bottom of the wing is perfectly flat, at zero degrees angle of attack the bottom surface exactly parallels the oncoming relative wind slipstreams. It technically has no bottom camber. If the airfoil is shaped like а teardrop (as in long distance models), the top camber almost equals the bottom camber, with a resultant "mean camber" of almost zero. A cavitated or "hollowed out" airfoil actually has a lot more going for it when you add just a little positive angle of attack to it. When this is done, you get an incredible amount of what we called "non-Bernoulli" lift before; the cavity created allows wind to hit a larger surface area along the bottom, redirecting the wind downwards which automatically pushes up on the airfoil. As RP-N mentioned, the groove in the Condor Comp is for drag. Actually, the grooves create more lift than the drag they add.

Now **TC** starts getting technical: And that's on a wing where the lower curve of the wing starts shortly after the leading edge. On a Condor, there is approximately 1/4" of flat area in front of and behind the groove. The wind will continue straight below the wing, in a zero deg. AOA. Just creating a small (hardly noticeable) low pressure area inside the groove. But the drag from the air having to pull away from that low pressure area will be noticeable. Anyone have a small wind tunnel we can put a wing of a Condor in?

Then **Rusty Harding** has to make things even more complicated: Actually, the slightly lower pressure would also reduce lift, the "rougher" surface within the groove would produce small eddy turbulence, which would, in turn, try to keep the airflow attached to the bottom of the wing. In my opinion, since nothing regarding oscillating, perhaps even reversing airflow has been considered, this is a discussion going nowhere. Biggest gain from this material removal, in my opinion, is a reduction in weight. Now you know why I didn't jump into the discussion right away. By the way, without duplicating pulsating airflow, wind tunnel testing would be meaningless, too.

John Villagrana has an interesting idea: Rusty, thanks for the input. Someday the USBA is going to publish your rang-list entries as a book and make a fortune.

Finally, **Rusty** sums up the inevitable difficulties with analyzing boomerang physics: The problem with spinning the boomerang in a wind tunnel is that instrumentation would be difficult to impossible. The mount and spin devices would have to be calibrated out of the readings, and all visual work would involve high speed photography. Spinning the tunnel (the test area only) would simplify things, but the test area would have to be large enough to keep from introducing error by disruptive airflow. I'm convinced that some day, someone will come up with a computer model of a wind tunnel that could test virtual boomerang designs. Meantime, it's back to the drawing board.

And I thought I used to understand how the Condor Comp grooves worked. In the next issue, we run with John's idea, but we aren't expecting any financial returns.

difference. While the Foster's Team appearances were part of a wellorchestrated, professionally promoted bid by Miller Brewing Company to gain notoriety for the sport and for their product, Foster's Lager, this was an unscripted, news story that involved one of the U.S.' top competition throwers. Further, she had been doing the very same thing that had happened hundreds of times on flights all around the world by boomerang competitors... well, almost the same thing. There was one word that seemed to differentiate this incident from the rest... a certain expletive referring to a part of the anatomy that is used commonly for the excrement of solid waste.

After Betsy had passed the security screener's usual litany of questions about the unusual contents of her carry-on bag, she was confronted by a state policeman who informed her that her reasons were no good for him and that, in spite of her protests, she would have to check her items or face arrest. The 43-year old trial lawyer by profession took her bag, turned to comply and, on her way, uttered the unflattering remark to the policeman. That was apparently too much for him, as he promptly arrested her for breach of the peace... presumably his.

When the state police account of the arrest was picked up by the national wire services and began to circulate across the country, most of the details except those that portrayed Betsy as a raving mad-woman were omitted.

Within the next several hours, Chet Snouffer, who was still inaccurately listed as the President of the USBA on the organization's laid-back web page, entertained dozens of news calls and live interviews—as did several other current and past members of the USBA officer corps.

Most of the interviewers had no idea that the U.S. even HAD a

boomerang team, let alone that they were involved in the upcoming World Cup competition in Germany. They were ready and willing to pick up on that related story. After all, it hit on several fronts; a great human interest story, with a world-class sport event tie-in, as well as the post-9/11 airport security issue that had resulted in what was widely perceived to be a sometimes ridiculous, over-zealous approach to airport security all across the country.

The USBA did what any promotional organization in its shoes would have done... it welcomed the publicity and milked the story. In a matter of forty-eight hours, no less than a dozen interviews were given on the upcoming World Cup, the way boomerang events are judged, the difference between returning sport boomerangs and non-returning hunting sticks, the fragile nature of boomerangs and the importance of carrying them onto an airplane, as opposed to checking them.

In addition, expert witness and head U.S. Team coach Eric Darnell prepared to help Betsy with her impending trial and a letter was being drawn up at press time to the National Transportation Safety Board about the importance of including competition boomerangs on the list of cleared items to be carried onto an airplane.

In the end, the incident resulted in about as much positive press as you could get. But in spite of that, serious issues remained. With the Team Cup just a couple of weeks away, and Betsy's legal troubles unsettled, there was, at press time, a question mark over whether she would be able to attend the Cup in Germany. Further, Betsy's legal career could be damaged or worse, if the incident proves to violate ethical codes established for lawyers in the state of Washington and at her law firm.

In spite of the seemingly ridiculous nature of the arrest, ramifications that could jeopardize both a career and a nation's attempt to win the World Cup of boomerangs could be held in the balance.

"The first thing to note, during this time of concern about airport security and the not so comforting stories of lapses in screening, is that another competitor carrying boomerangs in a manner similar to Ms. Miale-Gix, passed through the airport but a few hours earlier without a murmur or question from security. Hopefully this lack of consistency was an aberration."
